A member of your close family is defined as at least your spouse, live-in partner, parent, child, brother, sister and the spouses of any of these. Members may wish to be more prudent by extending that list to include grandparents, uncles, aunts, nephews, nieces or even close friends.

This information will be recorded in a Statutory Register. On such matters <u>you must not speak or vote</u>. Subject to the provisions of Sections 6.5 to 6.11 of the Code, if such a matter is to be discussed by your Council, <u>you must withdraw from the meeting whilst that matter is being discussed.</u>

2. Private or Personal Non-Pecuniary Interests

In addition you must also declare any <u>significant private or personal non-pecuniary interest</u> in a matter arising at a Council meeting (please see also Sections 5.2 and 5.6 and 5.8 of the Code).

Significant private or personal non-pecuniary (membership) interests are those which do not financially benefit or financially disadvantage you or a member of your close family directly, but nonetheless, so significant that could be considered as being likely to influence your decision.

Subject to the provisions of Sections 6.5 to 6.11 of the Code, you must declare this interest as soon as it becomes apparent and **you must withdraw from any Council meeting (including committee or sub-committee meetings) when this matter is being discussed**.

Commencement of the Meeting

At the commencement of the meeting, The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, welcomed those present to the meeting of Council which was being livestreamed to enable members of the public to hear and see the proceedings. The Mayor pointed out that, should the meeting go into committee to consider confidential business, any members of the press and the public in attendance would be required to leave the Council Chamber for the duration of those matters.

The Director of Organisation Development and Innovation outlined the evacuation procedures in the case of an emergency. The Right Worshipful the Mayor requested that all mobile phones be put on silent or switched off for the duration of the meeting and pointed out that, in accordance with the Council's Standing Orders, whilst the meeting was being live-streamed, unauthorised recording was not permitted.

Prayers

The Right Worshipful the Mayor advised that her Chaplain, Rev A Thompson, was unable to be present this evening and, in his place, she welcomed Rev P Jamieson from Hillhall Presbyterian Church. Rev Jamieson addressed the meeting and said a prayer, during which he remembered the following bereavements:

- Her Royal Highness, The Duchess of Kent.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, thanked Rev Jamieson for his attendance and he left the meeting (7.13 pm).

1. Business of The Right Worshipful the Mayor

1.1 Mayor's Engagements

The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, welcomed to the meeting, Ms J Hawthorne, Mr L Gunn and Ms F McGrath who were present in the Council Chamber and Mr A Kennedy, Mr C Stitt, Ms A McDermott and Mr G Davis who were joining the meeting remotely.

At the outset, the Mayor reminded Members that answers to pre-submitted questions of a strategic nature relating to the Housing Investment Plan had been provided earlier in the day on Decision Time. She also pointed out that DEA workshops had been arranged to take place on 13 October, at which operational issues could be addressed.

6.1 NIHE – Presentation of the Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council Housing Investment Plan 2025 (Contd)

Ms Hawthorne made a presentation, during which she covered areas such as community planning update, Housing Executive spend 2024/25, waiting list trends 2022-2025, the 15 year housing assessment market, affordable housing supply, projected spend 2025/26 and key housing challenges and opportunities.

A number of Members' queries were addressed in respect of:

- allocation of housing to people from the local community;
- succession policy;
- planning permission for programmed schemes;
- intermediate units;
- grants for rural areas;
- oil buying clubs;
- · direct exchange process; and
- assistance provided for partially-sighted tenants.

During discussion, NIHE representatives agreed to provide Members with:

- information on when the cavity wall insulation scheme would be implemented in the different housing areas;
- information on whether schemes programmed for this year were on target; and
- information in relation to the direct exchange policy.

It was noted that the following would be addressed at the forthcoming DEA workshops:

- discrepancy between disabled facilities grants awarded and the actual costs of completion since 2020/21; and
- actions to ensure contractors fulfilled their obligations.

Councillor P Catney put on record his thanks to Mr D Marley who was retiring as Lisburn and Castlereagh Area Manager. He also extended best wishes to Mr C Stitt, who had taken up this position.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, thanked the NIHE representatives for their attendance and they left the meeting (8.12 pm).

In response to comments by Councillor G Hynds regarding the delay in implementation of transparency measures, the Director of Organisation Development and Innovation gave a reassurance that the Council not only achieved, but exceeded, the statutory requirements on transparency. Members had already commended Officers for having increased transparency. The delay referred to by Councillor Hynds had been occasioned by there currently being no Director of Corporate Services nor Head of Service in post, but both posts were being actively recruited. The Council was meeting its obligations, but understood there was a need for progressing the Notice of Motion, which would happen as soon as was possible. Councillor P Catney concurred with comments made by Councillor Hynds.

A copy of the following Notice of Motion in the name of Councillor B Magee, had been circulated to Members with the notice convening the meeting:

"That this Council recognises the significant environmental impact of traditional burial and cremation practices, including high carbon emissions, chemical pollution, and long-term land use challenges, as highlighted in the All-Party Group on Climate Action's briefing paper "Beyond Burial and Cremation"

This Council further acknowledges the growing public interest in more sustainable, dignified, and low-carbon alternatives to conventional practices – such as natural (green) burials, tree pod interment, and other emerging end-of-life methods.

Natural burial, which involves the use of biodegradable materials, avoids embalming, and often takes place in woodland or meadow

settings with minimal ongoing maintenance, has already been successfully implemented in other parts of the UK as a simple and ecologically restorative option.

Accordingly, this Council agrees to:

- explore the feasibility of providing sustainable burial options within existing or new cemeteries, including the designation of natural burial grounds or woodland burial areas within our district; and
- 2. provide an update report to the All-Party Group on Climate Action on any identified legislative, planning, infrastructural, or regulatory barriers that may impact the delivery of these sustainable end-of-life options locally".

The Notice of Motion was proposed by Councillor B Magee and seconded by Councillor J Bamford.

The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, advised that the above Notice of Motion would be referred, without debate, to the Environment and Sustainability Committee for consideration.

Alderman S P Porter requested that the Environment and Sustainability Committee be advised of the number of requests received for these types of burials.

12.2 <u>Voting at 16</u> <u>Councillor J Harpur</u>

A copy of the following Notice of Motion in the name of Councillor J Harpur, had been circulated to Members with the notice convening the meeting:

"Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council believes that young people deserve a say in who represents them and welcomes the UK Government's announcement to allow people aged 16 and 17 to vote in future Westminster, Assembly and Council elections. This Council believes that this should be in place ahead of 2027 in time for the next Assembly and Council elections and calls on the First and Deputy First Minister to write to the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland to ensure that any necessary UK legislation is passed to meet this timeline".

The Notice of Motion was proposed by Councillor J Harpur and seconded by Councillor D Lynch.

Councillor J Harpur stated that he believed it was time to stop talking about the future and trust it. Young people should be given a real say in the direction of

our society. This Notice of Motion was responsible, democratic and overdue and was a cross-party issue. There were currently around 48,000 16 and 17 year olds in Northern Ireland – young people who lived, worked, paid taxes and volunteered here. Many were carers, already active in shaping their communities. They were trusted to leave school, get a job, pay National Insurance and even join the Armed Forces, yet they were not trusted to have a say in who represented them. As this Council's youngest Elected Member, Councillor Harpur knew what it was like to be underestimated because of age, but he also knew what young people were capable of when given the platform. The reality was that 16 and 17 year olds were already political beings, but not politically represented. Having spoken with youth councils and youth organisations across Northern Ireland, the message was clear that young people were ready – they wanted to vote and to have a seat at the table, yet on election day they were excluded. Councillor Harpur went on to speak about previous support in the NI Assembly in 2012 and 2024 in respect of extending voting rights to 16 and 17 year olds, support for this in Westminster and the fact that Scotland and Wales had moved ahead with this. Northern Ireland should not be left behind. Councillor Harpur alluded to the benefits that would be achieved by allowing 16 and 17 year olds to vote and urged his Council colleagues to support his Notice of Motion.

In seconding this Notice of Motion, Councillor D Lynch stated that Sinn Féin had been to the fore on this issue for a long time now, advocating that 16 and 17 year olds should be allowed to vote in future elections. It was positive news that the UK Government had announced that those young people could vote in future Westminster, Assembly and Council elections. Sinn Féin had been pressing the Irish Government to extend voting rights for the Irish Presidential election and would continue to do so. Councillor Lynch stated that 16 and 17 year olds were not just citizens of the future, they were full citizens now, playing an active and valuable role in society and he disagreed with the notion that they were not mature enough to play a role in the democratic process. He referred to Scotland and Wales and the other EU countries that had already extended their voting rights to 16 and 17 year olds. Sinn Féin had always advocated for a progressive and inclusive society where everyone had the right to shape their future.

Councillor G Hynds proposed an amendment to the Notice of Motion, namely that a final sentence be included – "Calls for expanded, non-partisan voter education programmes, partnering with schools, community groups, and government bodies, to inform youth, especially in areas with historically low turnout, about voting, equip them with knowledge for independent decisions, and encourage active, unbiased electoral participation". Councillor J Harpur confirmed that he was content with this amendment to his Notice of Motion.

A number of Members spoke in support of the Notice of Motion, and the amendment, namely Councillor P Catney, Councillor R Carlin and Councillor G Hynds. Councillor Hynds pointed out that, whilst he firmly believed that 18 remained the best age at which to have voting rights, the UK Government had announced the extension of voting rights to 16 and 17 year olds and Councillor

Harpur's Notice of Motion would ensure the young people of Northern Ireland were not left behind.

Councillor C McCready stated that his party, the DUP, considered that 18 was the right age at which to vote. As one of the younger Elected Members, he stated that he had gotten involved in politics at 16 and encouraged other young people to get involved in politics and find their way and their path. However, he pointed out that it had been made clear that extending voting rights to 16 would not happen by 2027. The Chief Executive of the Electoral Commission had advised that the Commission was under real pressure to run the elections smoothly by 2027. Councillor McCready stated that it would be best to get this right and not rush and, given those concerns, his party would be abstaining from the vote.

On a vote being taken, the Notice of Motion by Councillor J Harpur, including the amendment by Councillor G Hynds, was declared 'carried', the voting being as follows:

"That this Council recognises the significant disruption and distress caused to local communities by a small number of residents who engage in persistent antisocial behaviours, resulting in considerable frustration and anger for those living nearby.

This Council further calls on the Minister for Communities to review the current housing allocation system and to consider the following measures as part of that review:

- 1. Antisocial behaviour history that the applicant's record of antisocial behaviour, both in their current and previous neighbourhoods, is given greater weight within the allocation process.
- 2. Condition of previous property that the state in which an applicant has left any previous property, including any damage caused, is considered as part of their housing assessment.
- 3. Information sharing that full and effective sharing of applicant history between all public housing providers, including Housing Associations, is implemented to ensure a fair and accurate assessment under a revised allocation system".

The Notice of Motion was proposed by Councillor D J Craig and seconded by Councillor A P Ewing.

Councillor D J Craig stated that antisocial behaviour could involve many things – neighbours being noisy or having parties, children kicking a ball against a property, drinking and drug abuse, threats and violence against neighbours and, unfortunately, there had been a case very recently where a murder had occurred. Antisocial behaviour was a serious issue that needed to be tackled by housing providers. As an Elected Member, Councillor Craig had witnessed over the years, the impact of antisocial behaviour on others, resulting on many occasions in the victims being forced to move home, but seemingly no consequences for the perpetrators. He also alluded to the high costs to housing providers of having to repair damage caused to properties as a result of tenants' antisocial behaviour activities, adding to the backlog in maintenance schemes and often meaning properties were off the market for some time. Councillor Craig went on to speak about some specific cases. Currently, there was no mechanism whereby housing providers could take into account when allocating properties, the past behaviour of individuals and Councillor Craig would like that to change.

In seconding this proposal, Councillor A P Ewing stated that it was important to point out that the majority of residents were decent, respectful and law-abiding people from local areas. However, it only took a small number of unruly individuals to wreak havoc. The negative impact on local communities and

people's quality of life caused by antisocial behaviour should not be underestimated and this needed to be addressed urgently.

Councillor N Parker thanked Councillor D J Craig for bringing forward this Notice of Motion, which she supported, and proposed an amendment, namely that it include: "This Council further urges all Housing Associations to enter into formal information sharing agreements with the PSNI, similar to those already in place between the PSNI and the Housing Executive, so that best practice can be achieved and statutory bodies can work more effectively together with all relevant information". Councillor D J Craig confirmed that he was content with this amendment.

Councillor P Catney thanked Councillor D J Craig for bringing forward his Notice of Motion, which he supported, and proposed an amendment, namely that it include: "And further calls on the Minister of Justice to outline how her Department intends to tackle Anti-Social Behaviour from a criminal justice perspective, and to work with the Minister for Communities to assess how her Department can support and improve the housing allocation process". Councillor D J Craig confirmed that he was content with this amendment.

Councillors G Hynds and R Carlin spoke in support of the Notice of Motion.

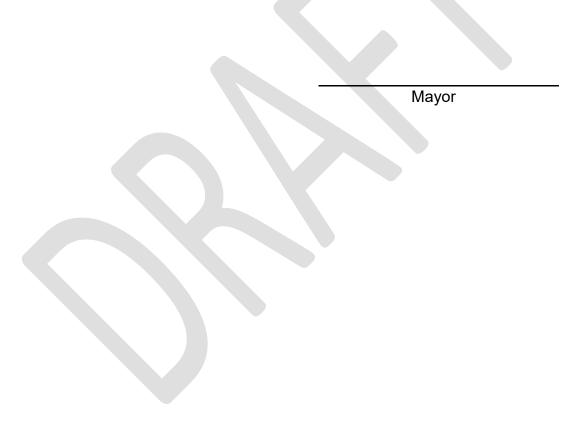

At the Council meeting held on 23 September, 2025, the following Notice of Motion had been proposed by Councillor B Magee, seconded by Councillor J Bamford and referred to the Environment and Sustainability Committee for consideration:

"That this Council recognises the significant environmental impact of traditional burial and cremation practices, including high carbon emissions, chemical pollution, and long-term land use challenges, as highlighted in the All-Party Group on Climate Action's briefing paper "Beyond Burial and Cremation".

This Council further acknowledges the growing public interest in more sustainable, dignified, and low-carbon alternatives to conventional practices – such as natural (green) burials, tree pod interment, and other emerging end-of-life methods.

Natural burial, which involves the use of biodegradable materials, avoids embalming, and often takes place in woodland or meadow settings with minimal ongoing maintenance, has already been successfully implemented in other parts of the UK as a simple and ecologically restorative option.

Accordingly, this Council agrees to:

- explore the feasibility of providing sustainable burial options within existing or new cemeteries, including the designation of natural burial grounds or woodland burial areas within our district; and

Councillor B Magee spoke of the environmental impacts of traditional burials and cremations and referred to the burial capacity within the Council area. She outlined the ways in which natural burials could be considered, alluded to their benefits and how those sites could be marked. Councillor Magee acknowledged that burials were deeply personal and should be discussed in a compassionate way. She stressed that her Notice of Motion did not seek to put an end to traditional burials or cremation. It was not committing the Council to anything other than exploring the feasibility of natural burials. It was important to create a

personal choice for individuals; many people who had been passionate about the environment during their lives may wish to extend that after their passing.

Councillor J Bamford stated that it was important to have a discussion around environmental and land capacity issues. The Notice of Motion recognised the need for greater personal choice. This was a sensitive issue and Councillor Bamford reiterated that the Notice of Motion did not seek to end traditional practices.

Following discussion, it was agreed to recommend that the Notice of Motion be approved, with Officers taking account of several points made by Members, as follows:

- this matter required to be dealt with in a sensitive manner;
- it was important that burial sites be documented and that there was a
 physical marker of where a burial took place in order that family members
 and friends had a place to come and visit;
- where burials took place in a forestry setting, there was a potential for damage to be caused by machinery; and
- costs required to be considered and traditional burial methods should not be priced out by natural alternatives.

Members had been furnished with a copy of the Council's draft response to the above consultation. The Head of Service pointed out that the Committee had been granted delegated authority to approve the draft response, subject to any further comment, for submission to the Department by 8 October, 2025.

At the request of Councillor G Hynds, the Head of Service agreed to emphasise in the Council response, the need for wider engagement with the public and local businesses.

Following discussion, it was proposed by Councillor P Catney and seconded by Councillor R McLernon that the draft response be approved and that each political party also submit their individual responses to the consultation document by 8 October, 2025.

It was proposed by Councillor C McCready and seconded by Councillor A Gowan that the Council would not submit a response but that political parties could submit their individual responses to the consultation document by 8 October, 2025.

The proposal in the name of Councillor P Catney was put to the meeting and, on a vote being taken, was declared 'carried', the voting being 10 in favour and 6 against.

4.2 <u>LCCC Draft Response to the DAERA Consultation on the Setting of Northern Ireland's Fourth Carbon Budget (2023-2042)</u>

The Right Worshipful the Mayor, Alderman A Grehan, left the meeting during consideration of this item of business (6.55 pm), as did Councillor A Gowan (6.56 pm).

It was proposed by Councillor D Bassett, seconded by Councillor P Catney and agreed to recommend that approval be given to the Council's draft response to the above consultation and that it be submitted to the Department by the closing date of 17 November, 2025.

4.3 The Climate Changes (Reporting Bodies) Regulations (NI) 2024

It was proposed by Councillor P Catney, seconded by Councillor D Bassett and agreed that the update in respect of the above Regulations be noted.

4.4 <u>Dual Language Street Naming Requests</u>

Councillor A Gowan returned to the meeting during consideration of this item of business (7.02 pm).

The Head of Services having responded to a number of Members' queries regarding the Council's Street Naming and Postal Numbering Policy, it was proposed by Councillor P Catney, seconded by Councillor D Bassett and agreed to recommend that the update in respect of 2 applications that had been received to have existing street names also expressed in Irish be noted.

Alderman J Tinsley requested that the report that would come back to Committee provide information in respect of the total cost involved, including Officers' time.

5. Report by Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk and Emergency Planning)

5.1 Food Control Service Plan 2025-2026

It was proposed by Councillor C McCready, seconded by Councillor P Catney and agreed that the Food Control Service Plan 2025-2026 be noted. Both Members commended Officers for the work they undertook to keep food standards high.

5.2 <u>Consultation on Local Authority and District Councils' Guidance on Grey</u> Market Goods in the UK

It was proposed by Councillor P Catney, seconded by Alderman J Baird and agreed to recommend that the Council's draft response to the above consultation be approved and submitted to the Food Standards Agency by the closing date of 24 October, 2025. The Food Standards Agency would be advised that the response was subject to ratification by Council at its meeting on 28 October, 2025.

5.3 Consultation Response on Proposed Dilapidation Bill

Councillor N Parker left, and returned to, the meeting during consideration of this item of business (7.20 pm and 7.23pm respectively).

Members had been furnished with a copy of the Council's draft response to the above consultation. The Head of Service pointed out that the Committee had been granted delegated authority to approve the draft response for submission to the Department by 10 October, 2025.

It was proposed by Alderman J Baird, seconded by Councillor G Hynds and agreed that approval be given to the Council's response and that it be submitted to the Department by the deadline.

Councillor G Hynds requested that the response make reference to the Bill being weak in respect of heritage and conservation buildings and could lead to demolition or inappropriate actions taken against them.

In advance of consideration of confidential business, the Chair, Alderman O Gawith, advised that Any Other Business would be considered at this stage.

6. Any Other Business

6.1 <u>Update Regarding Bins</u> Councillor C McCready

In response to a query by Councillor C McCready, the Director of Environmental Services advised that the first order of 4 RCVs should be delivered imminently. The outcome of the consultation currently with the Executive would inform what the Council's model for kerbside recycling would look like going forward and that was not yet available. The Director assured Members that, whilst there was no definitive outcome of the consultation, Officers were endeavouring to pre-empt some of the information in order to be able to move forward at pace once the outcome was known.

In response to further comments by Councillor McCready, the Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning) advised that a new waste treatment contract had come into effect in February, which would be active for a number of years, with significantly less and potentially no Council waste going to landfill.

6.2 <u>Dog Poo Bags</u> <u>Councillor C McCready</u>

In response to comments by Councillor C McCready, the Director of Environmental Services confirmed that, as agreed at last month's Committee meeting, distribution of dog poo bags by community groups was part of a suite of measures that would be considered to address environmental crime.

6.3 <u>Dog Poo Bags Dispensers – Drumbo</u> Alderman J Baird

Alderman J Baird asked that Officers consider the provision of dog poo bag dispensers and bins at a new walking path around the newly developed trim trail around the football pitch in Drumbo.

6.4 <u>Loose Coping Stones</u> Alderman J Baird

In response to a request by Alderman J Baird that action be taken to secure loose coping stones on a wall in Drumbo that had been built as part of the public realm scheme, the Director of Environmental Services confirmed that she was aware of this matter. There was some obscurity over who owned the foundations and who had carried out the work; however, she undertook to ascertain who would take responsibility for making the necessary repairs.

6.5 <u>Transportation of Waste</u> <u>Councillor P Catney</u>

Councillor P Catney referred to a current planning application at Tullynacross Road relating to a free-range poultry shed. He pointed out that he was a Member of the Planning Committee and had removed himself from consideration of this application. He voiced his concerns regarding the proposal that poultry waste would be transported along the small country roads in the vicinity of Tullynacross Road for disposal at a farm in Sligo. The Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning) explained that the Environmental Health Unit was a statutory consultee on planning applications. He confirmed that he would be content to engage with both residents and Elected Members regarding their concerns in respect of this application.

6.6 <u>Noise Complaints</u> Councillor A Gowan

Councillor A Gowan referred to earlier media coverage regarding a noise complaint that had been made against an establishment in the Council area. At his request, the Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning) outlined the procedure followed by Environmental Health Officers upon receipt of a noise complaint and what constituted a noise nuisance. Officers took note of a suggestion by Councillor Gowan that it would be useful if more information was made available on the Council's website and social media platforms to better inform the public of the processes followed regarding noise complaints.

6.7 <u>Car Parking in December and January</u> Councillor N Parker

Further to comments by Councillor N Parker, the Director of Environmental Services confirmed that there was already agreement in place, since 2023, that free car parking would be provided in the Council's off-street car parks each Saturday in December on an annual basis in both Lisburn City Centre and Royal Hillsborough; however, a decision was required to be made regarding any similar

arrangement for January. Councillor Parker stated that she had asked previously that a report with statistical data from last year be presented to Members in order to ensure that any decision made was useful to businesses and shoppers in Lisburn so the most value was being provided. The Director understood that monitoring had been carried out and was to form part of the Car Parking Strategy, which was being led by the Regeneration and Growth Department, and that there would be further consultation. It was her understanding that the information that had been gathered had been inconclusive in terms of the benefits to businesses, particularly in terms of the extension of free parking into January.

Lengthy discussion ensued, following which it was proposed by Councillor C McCready, seconded by Councillor G Hynds and agreed to recommend that free parking in the Council's off-street car parks in Lisburn City Centre and Royal Hillsborough be extended to each Saturday in January 2026. Councillor N Parker put on her record her frustration that the information she had asked for previously had not been forthcoming.

In response to comments by Councillor Parker regarding signage to notify drivers that parking in the Council's off-street car parks was free during December and January, the Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning) advised that signs were to be put in place at each pay station, but undertook to ensure this was carried out.

7. Confidential Report by the Director of Environmental Services

The Chair, Alderman O Gawith, advised that the confidential report item would be dealt with "In Committee" due to containing information relating to the financial or business affairs of any particular person (including the Council holding that information).

"In Committee"

It was proposed by Councillor C McCready, seconded by Councillor R McLernon and agreed that the following matter be considered "in Committee," in the absence of members of the press and public being present.

The member of the press seated in the public gallery left the Council Chamber (8.10 pm). Councillor A Gowan also left the meeting at this point.

It was proposed by Alderman J Baird, seconded by Councillor G Hynds and agreed to recommend that approval be given to the business case to enable progression of the procurement exercise for the Resurfacing Works Programme Phase 2.

The Head of Service (Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning) agreed to provide Councillor J Bamford with information on how the RAG analysis was calculated.

It was proposed by Councillor C McCready, seconded by Councillor P Catney, and agreed to come out of Committee and normal business was resumed.

The Chair, Alderman O Gawith, thanked Members for their attendance.

Commencement of Meeting

The Chairperson, Councillor C Kemp, welcomed everyone to the meeting and reminded them that the meeting was being audio recorded unless the item was being considered under confidential business. The Chairperson also outlined the evacuation procedures in the event of an emergency.

1. Apologies

It was agreed to accept apologies for non-attendance at the meeting on behalf of the Deputy Mayor, Alderman H Legge; Alderman A Ewart MBE and Councillor D Lynch.

2. Declarations of Interest

During the course of the meeting, Councillor U Mackin submitted a Declaration of Interest form in regard to the following item:-

Item 5.4 of Confidential report – "Addendum to Belfast Regional City Deal Business Case". Member of the Board of Governors of Beechlawn School, Royal Hillsborough which is referenced in the report.

3. Report of Head of Economic Development

3.1 Consultation on "Shaping Sustainable Places"

In collaboration with the Department of Agriculture, Environment & Rural Affairs (DAERA) and the Department for Infrastructure (DfI), the Department for Communities (DfC) had launched the above consultation on the 23rd June 2025 with a closing date for responses of the 21st September 2025.

The consultation outlined a proposed long-term, cross-departmental regeneration programme aimed at revitalising towns, villages and city centres across Northern Ireland and is available at Consultation on Shaping Sustainable Places | Department for Communities.

The narrative report identified the salient points of the consultation; key issues associated with Shaping Sustainable Places (SSP) and the potential funding that could be available to the Council if the SSP were to be approved.

In addition to the narrative report, a response prepared by Officers and submitted to the DfC by the stipulated closing date was provided. This had been prepared following consultation with the Regeneration & Growth Committee and also input from Leisure & Community Wellbeing and the Planning Section. The Director thanked the Members of the Committee for their input to the response.

The Equality Screening document and the Rural Needs Impact Assessment document had also been provided.

3.1 <u>Consultation on "Shaping Sustainable Places"</u> (Continued)

It was proposed by Alderman J Baird, seconded by Councillor U Mackin and agreed to recommend that:-

- the response to the "Consultation on Shaping Sustainable Places" be approved on a retrospective basis;
- the general direction of the integration of the Shaping Places interventions with the Council's works programme be agreed.

The Director confirmed that the issue of sustainable transport is contained within a different funding programme.

4. Report of Director of Regeneration & Growth

4.1 USA 250 – Strategic Engagement Opportunities

The Director referred to 2026 being the 250th anniversary of American independence.

Tourism NI had set out its America 250 objectives which fitted well with the Council's Economic Development Programme. The Director set out in his report, ways in which USA 250 could be marked with Destination Royal Hillsborough, other Council tourism assets and local businesses being showcased.

It was proposed by Councillor C McCready, seconded by Alderman J Baird and agreed to recommend that:-

- the report of the Director in regard to Strategic Engagement opportunities for USA 250 be noted;
- following clarification as to the regional approach to USA 250, a Council-led programme aligned with Tourism NI's America 250 objectives be developed for consideration by Members at a future point in time.

The Director noted American links suggested by Members, that could be pursued as follows:-

- Richard Polton and his talk on the American branch of the Barbour family;
- the Commissioner from Hillsborough, North Carolina, who had visited Hillsborough, Northern Ireland, recently.

4.1 <u>USA 250 – Strategic Engagement Opportunities</u> (Continued)

Furthermore, the Director noted comments from Councillor P Catney that – further to his Notice of Motion to commemorate Frederick Douglass (the American who had been born into slavery and who later became a social reformer and statesman) – the stained-glass window which had been proposed for First Lisburn Presbyterian Church (subject to Presbyterian Church in Ireland permissions) could be linked in some way to the USA 250 commemorations.

4.2 <u>Belfast Regional City Deal – Annual Report 2024-2025</u>

The annual report for 2024-2025 of Belfast Regional City Deal (BRCD) had been provided. Within the governance arrangements of BRCD, the Council was required to approve its annual report.

In his narrative report, the Director highlighted key issues associated with BRCD governance relevant to the Council, particularly those in relation to Destination Royal Hillsborough.

It was proposed by Councillor J Laverty, seconded by Councillor A Martin and agreed to recommend that the Belfast Regional City Deal annual report for 2024-2025 be approved.

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing's report highlighted the background and key issues in connection with the Notice of Motion on the subject of the inclusion of dogs at LCCC events that had been considered by the Committee in April 2025. The report also outlined proposals for two additional dog-friendly events, on a pilot basis which would be added to the events calendar along with supplementary programmes. The Director's report also detailed approximate costings and draft details of these events.

Councillor S Lowry entered the meeting at 6.08 pm.

Councillor A P Ewing, being the original proposer of this Notice of Motion, addressed the Committee during which he welcomed the proposed addition of two bespoke dog friendly events on a pilot basis. Councillor Ewing also was hopeful that these types of events would provide an opportunity for the local

business community to become involved; for example, the pet industry may wish to avail of the opportunity to provide sponsorship for such events.

Alderman S Skillen, having seconded the Notice of Motion, thanked Officers for their efforts in bringing forward the proposed addition of two bespoke dog friendly events, on a pilot basis. Alderman Skillen welcomed the inclusion of a bespoke dog-friendly event in Moat Park, Dundonald.

In responding to question from a Member in regard to the dog restriction at the Family Fun Day as part of the Mayor's Parade event, the Director advised that a number of pieces of information were considered to ensure the protection of patrons and dogs including advice from the Health & Safety Executive and other risk assessments.

It was proposed by Alderman A McIntyre, seconded by Councillor C Kemp, and agreed to recommend that:

- a) the proposed additional dog-friendly events on a pilot basis, as outlined in the Director's report be agreed, and in addition
- b) the Communities & Wellbeing Committee work alongside the Regeneration & Growth Committee in regard to the promotion of the Council's dog-friendly sticker initiative being promoted on the Visit Lisburn Castlereagh website.

Councillor B Higginson requested that a timetable for the Dog Exercise Meet Ups and the Paws & Purpose events be provided to Members, and also that the dog park at Lough Moss be included as a venue for these events.

3.2 <u>Funding (i) Dispersal Funding & (ii) Additional District Council Good</u> Relations Programme Funding

The Committee considered a report by the Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing outlining the background and key issues in connection with (i) the Dispersal Funding Programme which was funded by The Executive Office in partnership with the Home Office, and (ii) the additional funding for the District Council Good Relations Programme.

(i) Dispersal Funding

It was noted that the aim of the Dispersal Funding programme was to develop the capacity and infrastructure to support the arrival of newcomers into local communities, and in particular those with refugee and asylum status.

The Director's report highlighted that the Council had received an additional allocation of £27,573 under the same terms of the original Memorandum of Understanding issued by The Executive Office in 2022.

(i) Dispersal Funding (Cont'd)

The Committee had been furnished with copy correspondence from The Executive Office dated August 2025 outlining the amendments to the original Letter of Offer, together with the most recent copy of the MOU.

(ii) Additional District Council Good Relations Programme Funding

The Director highlighted that in addition to the dispersal funding, The Executive Office (TEO) had offered council an additional £20,000 under the District Council Good Relations Programme (DCGRP) to develop new or enhance existing programmes that particularly addressed social and racial cohesion. It was also noted that TEO had articulated that in addition to the £20,000 a further £27,000 could be made available in year. Unlike the dispersal funding all awarded funds for this workstream must be spent within the 2025/26 financial year and therefore the funds cannot be merged into one funding stream.

The Director requested that in addition to the recommendation in the report regarding the approval of the release of a Good Relations Strategic Fund, the Committee considers the granting of delegated authority to the Chairperson, Councillor T Mitchell, and the Vice-Chairperson, Councillor A Givan, in consultation with the Acting Head of Communities, which would allow the process of the award of grants to be accelerated and also ensure that the funding is spent by the deadline of March 2026.

The Director responded to questions from the Committee on a number of the key issues contained within the report and undertook to bring an update report to the Committee outlining the breakdown of the Dispersal Funding awards, along with sending information to Members regarding the Council initiatives

It was proposed by Councillor G Thompson, seconded by Councillor G McCleave, and agreed to recommend that:

a) Dispersal Fund:

- (i) the release of a further round of the Support Fund, as outlined in the report, with a maximum budget of £80,000, be approved, and;
- (ii) £25,000 be ringfenced for Council delivered local events and programmes

b) District Good Relations Fund:

(i) the release of a Good Relations Strategic Fund as outlined, with a maximum budget of £47,000, subject to TEO confirmation of budget, be approved, and

b) <u>District Good Relations Fund</u> (Cont'd)

(ii) delegated authority be granted to the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Committee, in consultation with the Acting Head of Communities, in regard to the award of funding to the successful groups, in view of the deadline for funding to be spent by March 2026.

The Chairperson, Councillor T Mitchell, left the meeting for the following two item of business, <u>Sports Accelerator Fund – DEA Sports Funding 2025/2026</u> and <u>Community Bursary Scheme 2025/2026 – Updated Outcomes to Date</u>, having declared an interest in those matters.

The Vice Chairperson, Councillor A Givan, took the Chair and conducted the following two items of business (6.17 pm).

4. Report of Head of Sports Services

Councillors A P Ewing, C Kemp and G McCleave also left the meeting having also declared an interest in item 4.1. (6.17 pm)

4.1 Sports Accelerator Fund – DEA Sports Funding 2025/2026

The Head of Sports Services' report outlined the background and key issues in connection with the Sports Accelerator Fund which aimed to support local constituted and affiliated to Sports Lisburn and Castlereagh Clubs through a maximum allocation of £3,000.

It was noted that there was a shortfall of £2,638.99 in this funding programme due to all successful applications having been accommodated at their respective score amount, but this additional contribution could be accessed through the DEA Investment Programme.

Members welcomed these funding awards and expressed appreciation in regard to groups in their respective DEAs having secured grant funding under this programme.

The Head of Sports Services noted comments by a Member in relation to one of the DEAs being recorded incorrectly as Lisburn South DEA.

It was proposed by Councillor J Gallen, seconded by Councillor S Lowry, and agreed to recommend that the award of grant to all 48 successful applicants, as presented, be noted.

5. Report of Acting Head of Communities

Councillors C Kemp and G McCleave returned to the meeting at 6.21 pm.

5.1 Community Bursary Scheme 2025/2026 – Updated Outcomes to Date

The Acting Head of Communities' report outlined the background and key issues in relation to the Community Bursary Scheme which formed part of the Council's DEA Local Investment Programme aimed at supporting individuals and organisations with access to progression routes for sport, music, language and/or cultural activities. For the 2025/26 programme Members had approved a budget of £25,000.

The Acting Head of Communities reminded Members that they had agreed the criteria for the Community Bursary Scheme in April 2024. Applications were assessed on an ongoing basis, as they were received, within the cycle of the fund; and then agreed under delegated authority by the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, in consultation with the Head of Communities. As part of the ongoing arrangements, the outcome of applications was brought to the Committee for noting.

A copy of the outcome of applications had been appended to the Officer's report.

It was noted that in 2024/25 there had been an underspend in the fund of £3,364, which has been rolled into 2025/26, giving a total fund allocation of £28,364.

The Acting Head of Communities responded to a question from a Member in regard to the timeline regarding a review of criteria for grant schemes. It was noted that this was likely to be presented some time in the new year following the appointment of the Monitoring and Evaluation Officer in November.

A Member put on record congratulations to Derriaghy Football Club for their success in winning the Foyle Cup this year, it being noted that the grant award to the Club had been valuable.

It was proposed by Councillor J Gallen, seconded by Alderman A McIntyre, and agreed to recommend that the outcomes of the Community Bursary Scheme be noted.

The Chairperson, Councillor T Mitchell, returned to the meeting and took the chair for the remaining items of business on the agenda.

6. Any Other Business – Non-Confidential

6.1 <u>Communication Boards in Parks</u> Councillor C Kemp

Councillor C Kemp put on record her thanks to Council Officers and also Solas for their efforts in progressing the pilot initiative on communication boards in parks, the feedback on which had been very positive. Councillor Kemp stated that this initiative was sending out the message that this Council was an inclusive city and was hopeful that the communication boards would be rolled out across all the parks in the Council area. Councillor Kemp acknowledged that the Estimates

process was now commencing and requested that this initiative be borne in mind during this time.

6.2 <u>Hilden Play Park, Lisburn & Play Park at Huguenot Drive, Lisburn</u> Councillor G Hynds

Councillor G Hynds referred to the thanks he had expressed at the September meeting of Council in regard to the repairs and maintenance that had taken place at the above play parks and requested an update thereon.

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing confirmed that Officers had been out and about in the parks for the purpose of conducting an audit on anything that needs repaired or replaced and undertook to provide Councillor Hynds with an update on the parks he had mentioned.

6.3 <u>Lisburn Marching Bands Tattoo</u> <u>Councillor G Hynds & Councillor B Higginson</u>

Councillor G Hynds referred to the issue of lack of provision of toilet facilities and barriers at the Lisburn Marching Bands Tattoo event in Lisburn City Centre the previous weekend. Councillor Hynds emphasised the importance of the toilet facilities being made available on the eventing of this event due to the large numbers of people attending this event.

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing advised that she was looking into this matter.

At a later point in the meeting Councillor B Higginson congratulated the organisers of the Lisburn Marching Bands Tattoo The event had attracted a huge crowd on the evening. Councillor Higginson requested that the Director share information on the breakdown in communication in regard to the lack to toilet facilities on the evening with the organisers.

6.4 Consultation Response – DOJ Consultation on the proposed expansion of Out of Court Disposals including Penalty Notices in the Justice Act (Northern Ireland) 2011

Councillor G Hynds

Councillor G Hynds referred to the above consultation by the Department of Justice which had been responded to, on behalf of the Council, by the PCSP. A copy of the Council's response had been circulated on the Committee's October Information & Correspondence schedule. Councillor Hynds put on record his deep concern in relation to this consultation, in particular in regard to certain crimes being dealt with by penalty notices rather than custodial sentences, such as assaults on police officers. Councillor Hynds was of the opinion that such criminal activity should be dealt with by a custodial sentence. Councillor Hynds stated that this would also be a great concern for the general public.

6.4 Consultation Response – DOJ Consultation on the proposed expansion of Out of Court Disposals including Penalty Notices in the Justice Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 (Cont'd)
Councillor G Hynds

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing advised that the Acting Head of Communities would convey Councillor Hynds' concerns to the PCSP.

Alderman A McIntyre highlighted that this consultation had been initiated by the PSNI in conjunction with the Department for Justice, and that individual parties and also individual Elected Members had been encouraged to respond to this consultation.

6.5 <u>European Heritage Open Days Thanks to Council Officers and Museum Staff</u> <u>Alderman A McIntyre</u>

Alderman A McIntrye conveyed thanks and appreciation to the Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing and Council Officers for their support and efforts in connection with the European Heritage Open Days that had taken place during 13th and 14th September 2025. Alderman McIntyre in particular commended the efforts of the Museum staff whom, he stated, had arranged a number of additional tours due to the volume of visitors attending these open days.

6.6 Wet Condition of Dog Exercise Area in Ballybeen Alderman S Skillen & Councillor S Lowry

Councillor R Carlin joined the meeting remotely at 6.35 pm.

Alderman S Skillen referred to the problem of the dog exercise area in Ballybeen being constantly swamped due to being on a flood plan and enquired if there was anything that Council Officers could do to address this issue. Alderman Skillen suggested that the Parks and Amenities team work with NI Water to consider how this matter could be addressed.

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing undertook to have this matter investigated.

6.7 <u>Accessibility of Pitches</u> Alderman S Skillen

Alderman S Skillen reported having received a telephone call the previous weekend from a constituent in connection with a sports pitch not being open. The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing undertook to have this matter investigated.

6.8 <u>Soft Play area at DIIB</u> <u>Alderman S Skillen</u>

Alderman S Skillen requested that a meeting with the Members of Castlereagh East DEA be convened in order to explore the options around developing the Soft Play area at DIIB

The Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing undertook to pick up on this matter with Alderman Skillen offline.

6.9 <u>Seniors Summer Scheme</u> <u>Councillor G Thompson</u>

Councillor G Thompson welcomed the update on the Age Friendly Programme, details of which had been included in the Committee's October Information & Correspondence Schedule (ICS). Councillor Thompson also highlighted that October was 'positive ageing month and wished to thank Officers for their efforts in regard to the various activities that had been organised as part of the Age Friendly Programme over recent months. Councillor Thompson also requested that these activities were promoted as much as possible.

Councillor Thompson having also welcomed the update on the Seniors Summer Scheme which had also been circulated in this month's ICS, highlighted the involvement of the PHA who were organising a conference in November on the subject of older people and had asked the Council to do a presentation on its Seniors Summer Scheme.

Councillor Thompson also drew the Committee's attention to the work of the South Eastern Regional College who were interested in doing an intergeneration programme next summer.

7. Confidential Report from Director of Leisure & Community Wellbeing

The Chairperson, Councillor T Mitchell, advised that the reason for confidentiality for each of the confidential reports was due to information relating to the financial or business affairs of any particular person (including the Council holding that information.)

It was proposed by Councillor B Higginson, seconded by Councillor C Kemp, and agreed that the Confidential Reports of the Director be considered "in Committee". The recording was paused at this stage in proceedings, and any members of the press and public left the meeting (6.40 pm).

1.0 **Background**

- 1. Section 76 (1) of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 (the Act) provides that any person with an estate in land may enter into an agreement with the relevant authority to:
 - Facilitate or restrict the development or use of land in any specified way;
 - Require specified operations or activities to be carried out in, on, under or over land:
 - Require the land to be used in a specified way;
 - Require a sum or sums to be paid to the planning authority or to a Northern Ireland government department on specified date/dates or periodically.

Key Issues

- It was resolved at a meeting of the Planning Committee on 08 January 2024 to grant planning permission for the demolition of an existing dwelling and construction of a pair of semi-detached houses and a row of four-terraced houses with associated site works and landscaping at 32 Lurgan Road and adjacent lands north west at Linen Fields, Lurgan Road, Moira.
- 2. The recommendation presented was subject to the developer entering into a Section 76 planning agreement to ensure that adequate provision is made for affordable housing as an integral part of the development in accordance with Policy HOU10 of the Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council Local Development Plan.
- The Developer Covenants with the Council at the first schedule of the agreement to provide two residential Units as Affordable Housing at the site. As per **Appendix 1**, the applicant advises that these units will be contained within the terrace of four dwellings at sites 94-97.
- 4. The wording of the covenant at Schedule 2 at **Appendix 2** is consistent with the recommendation in the addendum to the planning report that was agreed by the Planning Committee.
- 5. A copy of the Agreement is attached (see Appendix) and is also to be entered into under Article 8 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 2002 and Section 79 of the Local Government Act (Northern Ireland)

2014 and all other enabling powers must also accord with the Strategic Planning Policy Statement for Northern Ireland.

- 6. Members will note that this agreement was considered at the September Council meeting, and a query was raised in respect of the description of development used in the P1 application form attached at Annex 2. For clarity, the form attached included the original description of development, but this was subsequently amended during the application process. The most up to date P1 application form with the correct description of development has now been inserted at Annex 2. This does not alter the content or wording of the agreement in any way.
- 7. Under the Planning Act (NI) 2011 the Agreement must be sealed by the Council, under the Council's constitution the signing of legal documents and the affixing of the corporate seal is delegated to the Chief Executive.

2.0 **Recommendation**

It is recommended that the Council consider the above and that approval be granted to the signing and sealing of this Agreement by the Mayor and Chief Executive.

3.0 Finance and Resource Implications

The Developers shall pay to the Council on completion of this Deed the legal costs of the Council incurred in the negotiation, preparation and execution of this Deed. The Developers shall also pay to the Council on completion of this Deed a fee as a contribution towards the Council's costs of monitoring the implementation of this Deed.

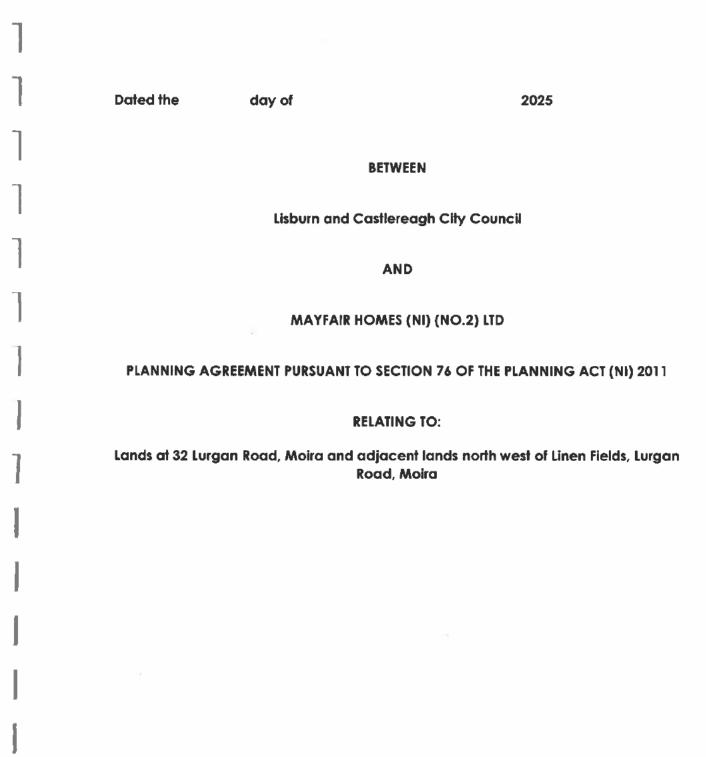

MAYFAIR HOMES (NI) (NO.2) LTD (Company Number: NI635215) whose registered office is at Hnh Partners Limited, Jefferson House, 42 Queen Street, Belfast, Northern Ireland, BT1 6HL ("the Applicant").

WHEREAS:

- A. The Council is the planning authority for the purposes of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 ("the Act") for the area in which the Application Site is situated as edged in red in the map at Annex 1.
- B. The Applicant has submitted the Planning Application for permission and is proposing to develop the Application Site.
- C. The Council must determine Planning Applications for residential housing based on the requirements of the planning policy set out in Policy HOU5 and as such the Affordable Units have been designated for use as Affordable Housing.
- D. The Applicant is the owner of the Application Site as certified in the Certificates of Title free from encumbrances (Annex 4).

- F. The planning obligations insofar as they relate to Section 76 of the Act on behalf of the Council and the Applicant in this Agreement are binding upon the Application Site.

NOW THIS DEED is made in pursuance of Section 76 of the Act and the covenants are covenants to which that Article applies.

DEFINITIONS

Affordable Housing: means housing that is provided outside of the general market for those whose needs are not met by the market. Parties - the Applicant, the Council;

Planning Agreement - means an agreement under section 76 of the Act;

Planning Application - a Planning Application for planning permission on the Application Site for a residential development comprising the proposed the demolition of the existing dwelling and the erection of a pair of semi-detached houses and 1 row of 4 terraced houses together with associated site works and landscaping and comprised in planning reference LA05/2020/0303/F;

Planning Permission - the Planning Permission granted by the Council in respect of the Planning Application;

Properties – means the individual residential units comprising 2 Affordable Units and 4 Private Housing Units to be built in accordance with the Planning Application approved by the Planning Committee on and any subsequent approvals (if applicable);

Private Housing Units – means the houses excluding the Affordable Housing Units and forming part of the Development.

Working Day - any day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, bank holiday or public holiday in Northern Ireland.

INTERPRETATION

- Where in this Deed reference is made to any clause, paragraph or schedule or recital such reference (unless the context otherwise requires) is a reference to a clause, paragraph or schedule or recital in this Deed.
- Words importing the singular meaning where the context so admits include the plural meaning and vice versa.
- 3. Words of the masculine gender include the feminine and neuter genders and words denoting actual persons include companies, corporations, authorities, firms or other such bodies including incorporated sporting clubs and associations and all such words shall be construed interchangeable in that manner.
- 4. Wherever there is more than one person named as a party and where more than one party undertakes an obligation all their obligations can be enforced against all of them jointly and severally and against each individually unless there is an express provision otherwise.
- 5. Any reference to an Act of Parliament or Order in Council shall include any modification, extension or re-enactment of that Act or order for the time being in force and shall include all instruments, orders, plans, regulations, permissions and directions for the time being made, issued or given under that Act or Order or deriving validity from it.
- References to any party to this Deed shall include the successors in title to that party and to any deriving title through or under that party and in the case of the Council the successors to its respective statutory functions.
- Words denoting any obligation on any party to do any act, matter or thing include an obligation to procure that it be done and words placing any party under a restriction include an obligation not to permit or allow infringement of the restriction.

LEGAL BASIS

- 8. The Deed is made pursuant to Section 76 of the Act and is a Planning Agreement for the purposes of that section.
- 9. Insofar as any of the covenants contained in this Deed are not planning conditions within the meaning of the Act they are entered into freely by the Applicant and by the Council pursuant to Article 8 of The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 2002, Article 79 of the Local Government Act (Northern Ireland) 2014 and all other enabling powers.
- 10. The Council is the local authority by which the covenants, restrictions and requirements imposed upon the Applicant under this Deed are enforceable or any successor.

- 11. The Parties agree that nothing in this Deed constitutes a Planning Permission or an obligation by the Council to grant Planning Permission and further agree that nothing in this Deed grants planning permission or any other approval, consent or permission required from the Council in the exercise of any other statutory function.
- 12. The Parties agree this Deed is enforceable against the persons entering into the Deed and against any person deriving title from that person.

CONDITIONALITY

- 13. Except for the provisions of Clause 35 (Jurisdiction) and 36 (Delivery), which shall come into effect immediately upon the execution of this Deed, all obligations contained within this Deed shall come into effect once full Planning Permission for the Development has been granted in full for the Application Site.
- 14. This will bind every part of the Application Site as detailed in the Planning Permission or as later varied by any future planning application approved by the Council or as agreed with consent from the Council or as discharged or modified under Section 77 of the Act.
- 15. These obligations continue unless discharged or modified under Section 77 of the Act.

THE COVENANTS

- 16. The Applicant covenants with The Council:
 - to observe and perform the obligations set out in the First Schedule on behalf
 of itself and its successors in title and all persons claiming under or through him
 or them and so as to bind each and every part of the Application Site;
 - (2) not to commence Development before the service of the Commencement Notice.
- 17. The Council covenants with the Applicant:
 - (1) to observe and perform the obligations set out in the Second Schedule on behalf of itself and its successors in function.

COUNCIL'S COSTS

MISCELLANEOUS

- 20. This Deed is registrable as a statutory charge in accordance with Section 76 and Section 245 of the Act and shall be registered as a charge on the land by the Council who will register this within a reasonable period following the execution of this Deed.
- 21. Where the agreement, approval, consent or expression of satisfaction is required by the Applicant from the Council under the terms of this Deed such agreement, approval, consent or expression of satisfaction shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- 22. Any notice or other communication to be given under this Deed must be in writing and must be delivered by hand or sent by pre-paid first-class post or other next Working Day delivery service.
- 23. Any notice or other communication to be given under this Deed must be sent to the relevant party as follows and in accordance with the provisions of Clause 20:
 - (1) to the Council at Lagan Valley Island, 1 The Island, Lisburn, BT27 4RL, marked for the attention of the Head of Service for Planning & Capital Development;
 - (2) to the Applicant at 42 Queen Street, Belfast marked for the attention of Alan Johnston or as otherwise specified by the relevant party by notice in writing to each other party.
- 24. Any notice or other communication given in accordance with this Deed will be deemed to have been received:
 - (1) if delivered by hand, on signature of a delivery receipt or at the time the notice or document is left at the address provided that if delivery occurs before 9.00 am on a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on that day, and if delivery occurs after 5.00 pm on a Working Day, or on a day which is not a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on the next Working Day.
 - (2) if sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service, at 9.00 am on the second Working Day after posting.
- 25. On the written request of the Applicant at any time after each or all of the obligations contained in Schedule 1 have been satisfactorily performed or otherwise discharged the Council will within 14 working days issue a written confirmation of such performance or discharge under Section 77 of the Act.
- 26. On the written request of the Applicant at any time after each or all of the obligations contained in Schedule 1 have been satisfactorily performed or otherwise discharged of (and subject to all parties meeting their own proper costs) the Council will within 14 Working Days lodge the appropriate application to cancel all entries made in the statutory charge register in respect of this Deed and furnish a copy of this application and the discharge to the Applicant or their successors or assigns and to their nominated solicitors.

- 27. This Deed shall cease to have effect (insofar only as it has not already been complied with) if the Planning Permission is quashed, revoked or otherwise withdrawn or is modified by any statutory procedure or expires prior to the Commencement of Development.
- 28. No person shall be liable for any breach of any of the planning obligations or other provisions of this Deed after it shall have parted with its entire interest in the Application Site but without prejudice to liability for any subsisting breach arising prior to parting with such interest.
- 29. Nothing contained in this Deed shall prejudice the discharge by the Council of their powers, duties or functions as may be conferred by statute or common law.
- 30. Unless otherwise specified no provisions of this Deed shall be enforceable under the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999.

WAIVER

31. No waiver (whether expressed or implied) by the Council or the Developers of any breach or default in performing or observing any of the covenants, terms or conditions of this Deed shall constitute a continuing waiver and no such waiver shall prevent the Council or the Developers from enforcing any of the relevant terms or conditions or for acting upon any subsequent breach or default.

INTEREST

32. If any payment due under this Deed is paid late, Interest will be payable from the date payment is due to the date of payment calculated on a daily basis and to be compounded at monthly rests, as well as before judgment.

JURISDICTION

33. Deed is governed by and interpreted in accordance with the law of Northern Ireland.

DISPUTES

34. Any dispute or difference arising between the parties with regard to their respective rights and obligations as to any matter or thing in any way arising out of or connected with the Deed will, except as otherwise expressly provided, be referred to the Courts of Northern Ireland for final determination and the parties agree that the courts of Northern Ireland shall have exclusive jurisdiction in respect of all matters under or in connection with this Deed.

DELIVERY

35. The provisions of this Deed (other than this clause which shall be of immediate effect) shall be of no effect until this Deed has been dated.

VALIDITY

36. If any clause in this Deed is found to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable then such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining provisions of the Deed.

1.0 **Background**

- 1. Section 76 (1) of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 (the Act) provides that any person with an estate in land may enter into an agreement with the relevant authority to:
 - Facilitate or restrict the development or use of land in any specified way;
 - Require specified operations or activities to be carried out in, on, under or over land:
 - Require the land to be used in a specified way;
 - Require a sum or sums to be paid to the planning authority or to a Northern Ireland government department on specified date/dates or periodically.

Key Issues

- 1. It was resolved at a meeting of the Planning Committee on 07 April 2025 to grant planning permission for thirteen dwellings (five detached and eight semi-detached) with detached garages, associated site works and pumping station.
- 2. The recommendation presented was subject to the developer entering into a Section 76 planning agreement to ensure that adequate provision is made for affordable housing as an integral part of the development in accordance with Policy HOU10 of the Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council Local Development Plan.
- 3. The Developer Covenants with the Council at the first schedule of the agreement to provide three residential units as Affordable Housing at the site.
- 4. It is stated in Schedule 1 that the Affordable Housing Units shall be located at sites '10, 11 and 12' as shown in the 'Proposed Site Layout and Planting Scheme Plan' at Annex 1 of the Agreement. The affordable units shall be available for occupation prior to occupation of the seventh dwelling unit permitted by the planning permission.
- 5. The wording of the covenants at Schedule 2 are consistent with the recommendation in the planning report (see paragraphs 97 to 100) that was agreed by the Planning Committee.
- 6. A copy of the Agreement is attached (see Appendix) and is also to be entered into under Article 8 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern

PLANNING AGREEMENT PURSUANT TO SECTION 76 OF THE PLANNING ACT (NI) 2011

BETWEEN:

Lisburn & Castlereagh City Council of Civic Centre, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn, BT27 4RL ("the Council"); and

Nagarrick Holdings Limited whose registered office is at 7 Donegall Square North, Belfast, BT1 5GB ("the Applicant").

WHEREAS:

- A The Council is the planning authority for the purposes of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 ("the Act") for the area in which the Application Site is situated as edged in red in the map at Annex 1 and has various planning functions under the Act and is entitled to make this Agreement by virtue of section 76 thereof.
- B. The Applicant is the registered owner of the lands comprising the Application Site being the land shown edged red on the Location Map at Annex 1 which comprises the lands in part of the Land Registry Folio numbers DN20846, DN38059, DN186837 & DN210740 County Down should on the Land Registry maps annexed hereto.
- C. The Applicant submitted a Planning Application (Annex 3) for permission and proposed to develop the Application Site for 13 dwellings (5no. detached and 8no. semi- detached) with detached garages and associated site work plus pumping station;
- D. The Application Site is located at 39a Gravelhill Road, Lisburn and within the Settlement Development Limit of Long Kesh.
- E. On the 7th April 2025 the Council's Planning Committee, having regard to the provisions of the Local Plan and to all other material considerations, resolved at its meeting to approve the planning permission on the Application Site in accordance with the Planning Permission comprised in planning reference LA05/2023/0623/F.
- F. The approved planning permission is subject to planning conditions as well as this Agreement pursuant to Section 76 of the Act to ensure that the developer fulfils his obligations with regard to the delivery of Affordable Housing in accordance with the requirements of policy HOU10 of the Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council Plan Strategy.
- G. The planning obligations insofar as they relate to Section 76 of the Act on behalf of the Council and the Applicant in this Agreement are binding upon the Site.

NOW THIS DEED is made in pursuance of Section 76 of the Act and the covenants are covenants to which that Article applies.

WITNESSES AS FOLLOWS:

DEFINITIONS

Act - The Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011;

Affordable Housing - means Social Rented Housing; Intermediate Housing for Rent; or Intermediate Housing for sale, that is provided outside of the general market, for those whose needs are not met by the market. Affordable housing which is funded by Government must remain affordable or alternatively there must be provision for the public subsidy to be repaid or recycled in the provision of new affordable housing;

Affordable Housing Units - A minimum of 3 Residential Units provided for Affordable Housing within the Application Site, the proposed location for which is shown in the Proposed Site Layout and Planting Scheme plan at Annex 1.

Applicant - Nagarrick Holdings Limited;

Available for Occupation - means together the following:

- a) available for Occupation; and
- b) the issuance of a Building Regulations Completion Certificate pursuant to the Building Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2012 (as amended)

Application Site - 39a Gravelhill Road, Lisburn, BT27 SRW shown outlined in red in the Site Location map at Annex 1.

Certificate of Practical Completion - confirmation from a duly authorised architect that the developed Properties, or any part thereof, is capable of being used for the purpose for which Planning Permission was granted;

Commencement Date - the date the Commencement of Development occurs.

Commencement Notice - a notice in writing to be served upon the Council by the Applicant notifying it of the Applicant's intention to carry out Commencement of Development, a copy of which is annexed to this Agreement at Annex 4. Such notice shall include confirmation of the date upon which Commencement of Development is expected to take place and shall contain the reference number for the Planning Application and confirm the clause of this Deed pursuant to which it is being given;

Commencement of Development - shall have the meaning given in Section 63 of the Act in the carrying out in relation to the Development of any material operation save that for the purposes of this Deed none of the following operations shall constitute commencement:

- Any archaeological or site investigations;
- (2) Works of excavation;
- (3) Demolition;
- (4) Site clearance;
- (5) Diversion of services and installation of services for construction purposes only;
- (6) Site or soil investigations;

- (7) Remedial action in respect of any contamination;
- (8) Interim landscaping works;
- (9) Provision of construction access; and
- (10) Noise attenuation works for the erection of hoardings and fences.

Completion - the completion of the Development of the Application Site as evidenced by a Certificate of Practical Completion provided by the Applicant if reasonably requested by the Council and the issue of building control completion certificates relating to the Application Site and a copy being provided by the Applicant of their architect's practical completion certificate;

Development - residential development comprising 13 Residential Units (5no detached and 8no semi-detached) with detached garages and associated site works plus pumping station in accordance with the Planning Permission and shown for indicative purposes on the Proposed Site Layout and Planting Scheme plan at Annex 1 or as varied by any reasonable requirements of the Planning Committee;

Default Interest Rate - interest at 2% above the base lending rate of the Bank of England from time to time;

Intermediate Housing – means those Residential Units which shall be co-ownership, shared ownership or Intermediate Housing for Rent or such other product to be agreed in writing by the Council. Intermediate Housing means housing that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rents and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

Intermediate Housing for Rent – means housing delivered by a Registered Housing Association that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rent and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

Intermediate Housing for Sale – means shared ownership housing provided through a Registered Housing Association (for example, the Co Ownership Housing Association) in order to help households who can afford a small mortgage, but that are not able to afford to buy a property outright. The property is split between part ownership by the householder and part social renting from the Registered Housing Association. The proportion of property ownership and renting can vary depending on householder circumstances and preferences;

Monitoring Fee – means £1,750 exclusive of VAT being the fee payable to the Council towards its reasonable and proper costs in monitoring compliance with this Deed, such figure to increase by the rate of inflation of the Consumer Price Index on an annual basis until the Commencement of Development or until the Monitoring Fee is paid (whichever is the sooner);

Occupation – the physical use of land or buildings permitted by the Planning Permission but not including occupation by personnel engaged in construction or fitting out, or occupation for marketing and display, or occupation in relation to security operations and Occupy, Occupied and Occupier shall be construed accordingly.

Parties - the Applicant, the Council;

Planning Agreement - means an agreement under section 76 of the Act;

Planning Application - a Planning Application for planning permission on the Application Site for a proposed housing development consisting of 13 dwellings (5no detached and 8no semi-detached) with detached garages and associated site work plus pumping station. Existing dwelling No. 39a Gravelhill Road to be demolished under planning reference LA05/2023/0623/F.

Planning Permission - the Planning Permission to be granted by the Council in respect of the Planning Application;

Property - The 13 Residential Units to be developed at the Application Site in accordance with the Planning Permission and shown for indicative purposes on the Proposed Site Layout and Planting Scheme plan at Annex 1.

Residential Unit(s) - a building or part of a building constructed pursuant to the Planning Permission intended for use as a separate dwelling in the occupation of one household and which shall include, without prejudice to the generality for the foregoing, an apartment, a maisonette, a semi-detached dwelling, a town house or terrace property or a detached dwelling house.

Sale - the sale, assignment, or disposition of the Application Site, or any of the Residential Units;

Social Rented Housing – those Residential Units to be provided at an affordable rent by a Registered Housing Association made available to households in housing need and offered in accordance with the common selection scheme administered by NIHE which prioritises households living in unsuitable or insecure accommodation.

Working Day - any day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, bank holiday or public holiday in Northern Ireland.

INTERPRETATION

- Where in this Deed reference is made to any clause, paragraph or schedule or recital such reference (unless the context otherwise requires) is a reference to a clause, paragraph or schedule or recital in this Deed.
- A person includes a natural person, corporate or unincorporated body (whether or not having separate legal personality).
- 3. A reference to a **company** shall include any company, corporation or other body corporate, wherever and however incorporated or established.

- Words importing the singular meaning where the context so admits include the plural meaning and vice versa.
- 5. Words of the masculine gender include the feminine and neuter genders and words denoting actual persons include companies, corporations, authorities, firms or other such bodies including incorporated sporting clubs and associations and all such words shall be construed interchangeable in that manner.
- 6. Wherever there is more than one person named as a party and where more than one party undertakes an obligation all their obligations can be enforced against all of them jointly and severally and against each individually unless there is an express provision otherwise.
- 7. Any reference to a statute or statutory provision shall include any modification, extension or re-enactment of that statute or statutory provision from time to time and shall include any subordinate legislation made from time to time under that statute or statutory provision or deriving validity from it.
- 8. A reference to writing or written excludes faxes and e-mail.
- 9. A reference to this deed or to any other deed or document referred to in this deed is a reference to this deed or such other deed or document as varied or novated (in each case, other than in breach of the provisions of this deed) from time to time.
- 10. References to clauses and Schedules are to the clauses and Schedules of this deed.
- 11. References to any party to this Deed shall include the successors in title to that party and to any deriving title through or under that party and in the case of the Council the successors to its respective statutory functions.
- 12. Words denoting any obligation on any party to do any act, matter or thing include an obligation to procure that it be done and words placing any party under a restriction include an obligation not to permit or allow infringement of the restriction.
- 13. Any words following the terms including, include, in particular, for example or any similar expression shall be construed as illustrative and shall not limit the sense of the words, description, definition, phrase or term preceding those terms.
- 14. Where an obligation falls to be performed by more than one person, the obligation can be enforced against every person so bound jointly and against each of them individually.

LEGAL BASIS

- 15. The Deed is made pursuant to Section 76 of the Act and shall be deemed to be planning obligations in respect of the Application Site for the purposes of that section but without prejudice to all and any other means of enforcing them at law or in equity or by statute.
- 16. Insofar as any of the covenants, restrictions or obligations contained in this Deed are not planning conditions within the meaning of the Act they are entered into

freely by the Applicant and by the Council pursuant to Article 8 of The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 2002, Article 79 of the Local Government Act (Northern Ireland) 2014 and all other enabling powers with the intention that they bind the interests held by those persons in the Property, and their successors and assigns.

- 17. The Council is the local authority by which the covenants, restrictions and requirements imposed upon the Applicant under this Deed are enforceable or any successor in title or assigns.
- 18. The Parties agree that nothing in this Deed constitutes a Planning Permission or an obligation by the Council to grant Planning Permission and further agree that

- nothing in this Deed grants planning permission or any other approval, consent or permission required from the Council in the exercise of any other statutory function.
- 19. The Parties agree that the covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in this Deed are planning obligations for the purposes of the Act and are entered into by the Parties and are enforceable against the persons entering into the Deed and against any person deriving title from that person in accordance with section 76 of the Act.
- 20. No person will be liable for any breach of this Agreement unless they hold an interest in that part of the Application Site in respect of which such breach occurs or hold such an interest at the date of the breach provided that the person shall remain liable for any antecedent breach.

CONDITIONALITY

- 21. Except for the provisions of Clause 48 (Jurisdiction) and 49 (Delivery), all obligations contained within this Deed shall came into effect once this Agreement is executed. This Agreement is conditional upon the grant and issue of the Planning Permission and the Commencement of Development.
- 22. The obligations under this Agreement are inextricably linked to the obligations under the Planning Permission granted.
- These obligations continue unless discharged or modified under Section 77 of the Act.

THE COVENANTS

- 24. The Applicant covenants with The Council:
 - (1) to observe and perform the obligations set out in the First Schedule on behalf of itself and its successors in title and all persons claiming under or through him or them and so as to bind each and every part of the Application Site;
 - (2) not to commence Development before the service of the Commencement Notice.
- 25. The Council covenants with the Applicant:
 - (1) to observe and perform the obligations set out in the Second Schedule on behalf of itself and its successors in title.

COSTS

26. The Applicant shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed the Council's reasonable and proper legal costs together with all disbursements incurred in connection with advice to the Council relating to this deed and the drafting, preparation, negotiation, completion and registration of this deed.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 27. This Deed is registrable as a statutory charge and shall be registered as a statutory charge in the statutory charges register by the Council in accordance with Section 76 and Section 245 of the Act within a reasonable period following the execution of this Deed.
- 28. Where the agreement, approval, consent or expression of satisfaction is required by the Applicant from the Council under the terms of this Deed such agreement, approval, consent or expression of satisfaction shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- 29. Any notice or other communication to be given under this Deed must be in writing and must be delivered by hand or sent by pre-paid first-class post or other next Working Day delivery service.
- 30. Any notice or other communication to be given under this Deed must be sent to the relevant party as follows and in accordance with the provisions of Clause 29:
 - to the Council at Civic Centre, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn BT27 4RL marked for the attention of the Head of Planning and Capital Development; and
 - (2) to the Applicant c/o Paul Skelly of 9 Drumview Road, Lisburn, BT27 6YF or as otherwise specified by the relevant party by notice in writing to each other party.
- 31. Any notice or other communication given in accordance with this Deed will be deemed to have been received:
 - (1) if delivered by hand, on signature of a delivery receipt or at the time the notice or document is left at the address provided that if delivery occurs before 9.00 am on a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on that day, and if delivery occurs after 5.00 pm on a Working Day, or on a day which is not a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on the next Working Day.
 - (2) if sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service, at 9.00 am on the second Working Day after posting.
- 32. On the written request of the Applicant at any time after each or all of the obligations contained in Schedule 1 have been satisfactorily performed or otherwise discharged of (and subject to the payment of the Council's reasonable and proper costs and charges) the Council will lodge the appropriate application to cancel all entries made in the statutory charge register in respect of this Deed and furnish a copy of this application and the discharge to the Applicant or their successors or assigns and to their nominated solicitors.
- 33. This Deed shall cease to have effect (insofar only as it has not already been complied with) if the Planning Permission is quashed, revoked or otherwise withdrawn or is modified by any statutory procedure or expires prior to the

Commencement of Development. The obligations in this Deed shall cease to have effect if before the Commencement of Development, the Planning Permission is quashed following a successful legal challenge (including on foot of an application for judicial review pursuant to Order 53 of The Rules of the Court of Judicature (NI) 1980).

- 34. No person shall be liable for any breach of any of a covenant, restriction or obligation or other provisions of this Deed after it shall have parted with its entire interest in the Application Site to which the breach relates but without prejudice to liability for any subsisting breach arising prior to parting with such interest.
- 35. Nothing contained in this Deed shall prejudice the discharge by the Council of their powers, duties or functions as may be conferred by statute or common law.
- 36. Unless otherwise specified no provisions of this Deed shall be enforceable under the
 - Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999.
- 37. This Agreement and the Schedules to it shall constitute the entire Agreement and understanding between the parties with respect to all matters which are referred to in it and the subject matter of it and shall supersede any previous Agreement(s), prior drafts, undertakings, representations, warranties and arrangements of any nature whatsoever whether or not in writing between the parties in relation to the matters referred to in this Agreement or in connection with the subject matter of it.
- 38. Each of the parties acknowledges and agrees that it has not been induced to enter into this Agreement in reliance upon, and has not given, any warranty, representation, statement, Agreement or undertaking of any nature whatsoever other than as expressly set out in this Agreement.
- 39. Nothing in this Agreement shall operate to exclude or limit any liability for fraud.
- 40. The Developer warrants to the Council that they have not leased mortgaged charged or otherwise created any interest in the Application Site at the date of this Agreement.
- 41. This Agreement is a deed.

WAIVER

42. No failure or delay by the Council to exercise any right or remedy provided under this Deed or by law shall constitute a waiver of that or any other right or remedy. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy.

FUTURE PERMISSIONS

43. This deed, to the extent outlined in the First Schedule restricts the use of the Property pursuant to the Planning Permission in accordance with Section 76 of the Planning Act unless otherwise

- agreed by amendment to this deed in accordance with the Planning Act.
- 44. Nothing in this deed shall prohibit or limit the right to develop any part of the Property in accordance with any planning permission (except for the Planning Permission or any modification, variation or amendment thereof pursuant to section 54 of the Planning Act which shall be so bound) granted after the date of the Planning Permission.

INTEREST

45. If any sum or amount has not been paid to the Council by the date it is due under this Deed, the Applicant shall pay to the Council Interest on that amount at the Default Interest Rate (both before and after any judgment). Such interest shall accrue on a daily basis for the period from the due date to and including the date of payment.

OWNERSHIP

46. The Developer warrants that no person other than the Developer has any legal or equitable interest in the Property.

NO FETTER OF DISCRETION

47. Nothing (contained or implied) in this deed shall fetter or restrict the Council's statutory rights, powers, discretions and responsibilities. In particular, nothing in this deed shall fetter the powers of the Council under the Planning Act relating to its determination of any planning application lodged in the future relating to the Property.

JURISDICTION

48. Each party irrevocably agrees that the Courts of Northern Ireland shall have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with this deed or its subject matter or formation (including non-contractual disputes or claims) and that it is governed in accordance with the law of Northern Ireland.

DELIVERY

49. The provisions of this Deed (other than this clause which shall be of immediate effect) shall be of no effect until this Deed has been dated.

VALIDITY

50. If any clause in this Deed is found to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable then such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining provisions of the Deed.

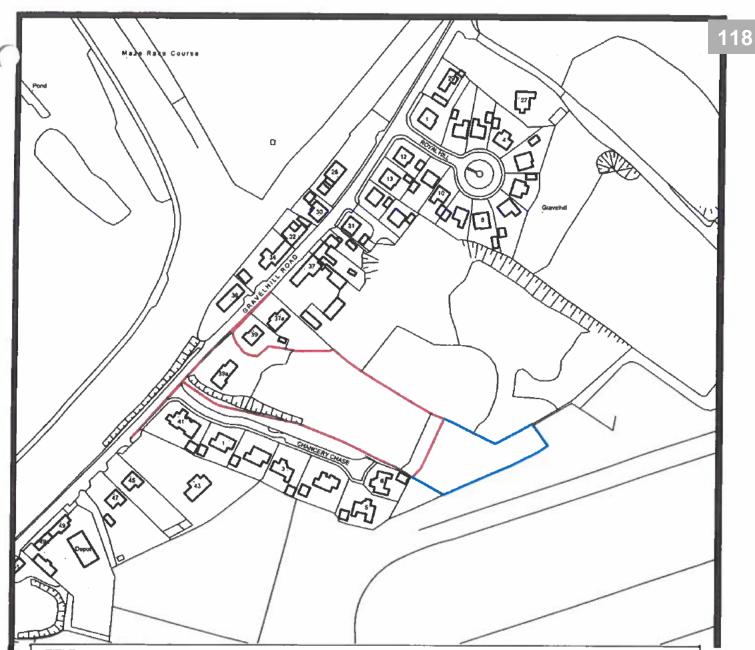

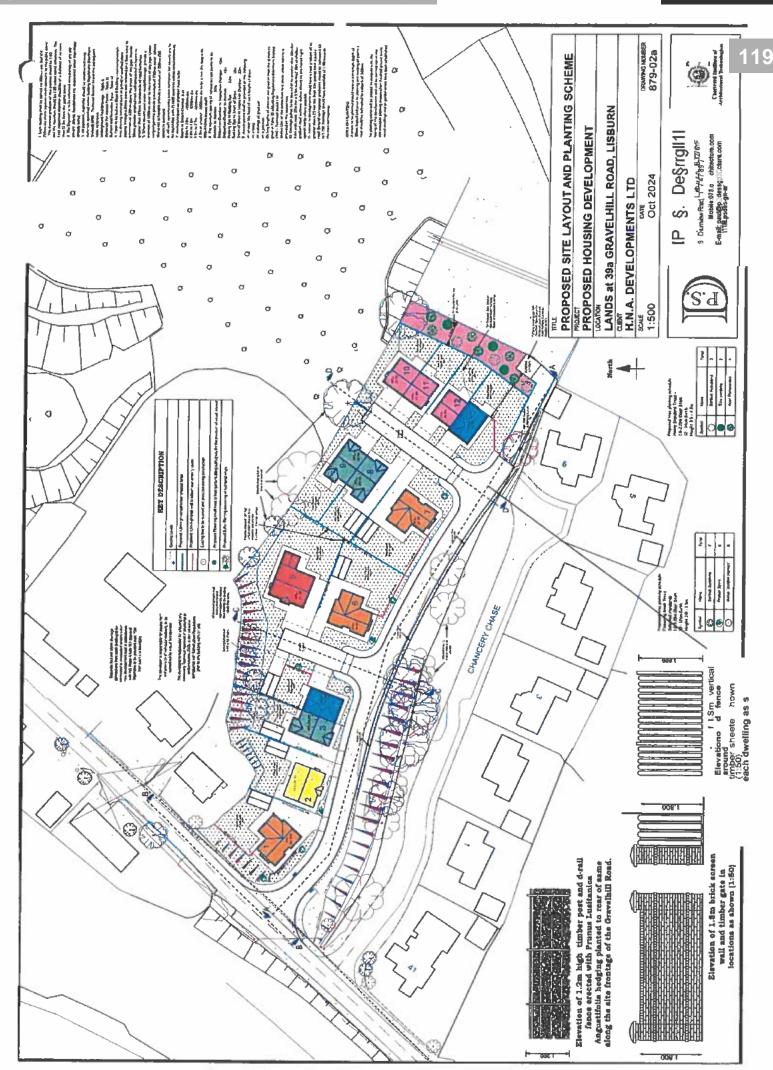

1.0 **Background**

- 1. Section 76 (1) of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 (the Act) provides that any person with an estate in land may enter into an agreement with the relevant authority to:
 - Facilitate or restrict the development or use of land in any specified way;
 - Require specified operations or activities to be carried out in, on, under or over land:
 - Require the land to be used in a specified way;
 - Require a sum or sums to be paid to the planning authority or to a Northern Ireland government department on specified date/dates or periodically.

Key Issues

- 1. It was resolved at a meeting of the Planning Committee on 04 August 2025 to grant planning permission for six detached and two semi-detached properties in lieu of three apartment blocks formerly approved under existing permission LA05/2020/0593/F on lands directly adjacent to 1-60 Moira Gate, Moira.
- 2. The recommendation presented was subject to the developer entering into a Section 76 planning agreement to ensure that adequate provision is made for affordable housing as an integral part of the development in accordance with Policy HOU10 of the Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council Local Development Plan.
- 3. The Developer Covenants with the Council at the second schedule of the agreement to provide two residential units as Affordable Housing at the site.
- 4. It is stated in Schedule 2 that the Affordable Housing Units shall be located at sites "64" and "65" as shown in Plan 2 in Schedule 1 of the Agreement. The affordable units shall be available for occupation prior to occupation of the fourth dwelling unit permitted by the planning permission.
- 5. The wording of the covenants at Schedule 2 are consistent with the recommendation in the planning report (see paragraphs 93 to 95) that was agreed by the Planning Committee.
- 6. A copy of the Agreement is attached (see Appendix) and is also to be entered into under Article 8 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern

- F. The Council is willing to grant the Planning Permission pursuant to the Planning Application subject to the parties entering into this agreement to make provision for and secure the matters set out below.

It is agreed as follows:

1 Definitions and interpretation

1.1 In this agreement, unless the context otherwise requires, the following words have the following meanings:

3 Conditionality

With the exception of clauses 12 (Jurisdiction) and 13 (Delivery), which shall come into effect immediately, this agreement is conditional upon the grant and issue of the Planning Permission and the Commencement of Development.

4 Statutory provisions and covenants

- 4.1 This agreement is entered into pursuant to the provisions of section 76 of the Act and shall be deemed to be planning obligations in respect of the Application Site for the purposes of that section but without prejudice to all and any other means of enforcing them at law or in equity or by statute.

- 7.4 Subject to Clause 7.5 below any such notice, consent or other document shall be deemed to have been duly received:
 - 7.4.1 if despatched by first class, registered post 48 hours from the time of posting to the relevant party (excluding the period from 5pm on a Friday to 8am on a Monday); or
 - 7.4.2 if despatched by hand delivery at the time of actual delivery; or
 - 7.4.3 if despatched by email 24 hours after the time of the despatch (excluding the period from 5pm on a Friday to 8am on a Monday).

- 7.5 In proving service by post it will be sufficient (unless any relevant part of the postal service is affected by industrial action) to prove that the envelope containing the notice was duly stamped addressed and posted (subject to clause 7.3) to the addresses specified in clause 8.3 of this agreement. In proving service by email it shall be sufficient to prove that it was properly addressed and dispatched to the numbers or address specified in clause 8.3.
- 7.6 A party shall not attempt to prevent or delay the service on it of a notice under this agreement.

8 Waiver

- 8.1 No delay or failure on the part of any party in enforcing any provision in this agreement shall be deemed to be a waiver or create a precedent or in any way prejudice any party's rights under this agreement.
- The rights and remedies provided in this agreement are cumulative and are additional to any rights or remedies provided by law.

9 Miscellaneous

- 9.1 If any party defaults in the payment when due of any sum payable under this agreement (whether pursuant to a court order or otherwise) the liability of that party in default shall be increased to include interest on such sum from the date when such payment was due until the date of actual payment at a rate of 2% above the base rate from time to time of Bank of England such interest shall accrue from day to day and shall be compounded annually.
- 9.2 Nothing in this agreement fetters or restricts the exercise by the Council of any of its powers as Local Planning Authority including, without limitation, the right of the Council to seek injunctive relief, as per paragraph 12 and/or paragraph 14.. For the avoidance of doubt, in the event of any conflict between this clause and the Arbitration clause at paragraph 14 this clause shall prevail.
- 9.3 This agreement and the Schedules to it shall constitute the entire agreement and understanding between the parties with respect to all matters which are referred to in it and the subject matter of it and shall supersede any previous agreement(s), prior drafts, undertakings, representations, warranties and arrangements of any nature whatsoever whether or not in writing between the parties in relation to the matters referred to in this agreement or in connection with the subject matter of it.
- 9.4 Each of the parties acknowledges and agrees that it has not been induced to enter into this agreement in reliance upon, and has not given, any warranty, representation, statement, agreement or undertaking of any nature whatsoever other than as expressly set out in this agreement.
- 9.5 Nothing in this agreement shall operate to exclude or limit any liability for fraud.
- 9.6 If any provision in this agreement shall be held to be invalid illegal or unenforceable the validity legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions of it shall not in any way be deemed to be affected or impaired.
- 9.7 The Developer warrants to the Council that they have not leased mortgaged charged or otherwise created any interest in the Application Site at the date of this agreement.
- 9.8 This agreement is a deed.

10 Statutory Charge

- This deed is registrable as a statutory charge in accordance with section 76 and section 245 of the Act and shall be registered as a charge on the Statutory Charges Register by the Council. The parties consent to the registration of this deed as a statutory charge on titles numbered, 30205, 30392, 30633, DN149239,30396 and 34669 County Down
- 10.2 Following the satisfactory performance and satisfaction of the obligations contained in the Second Schedule to this deed the Council shall, upon written request from the Developer, provide written confirmation of the discharge of those obligations and effect the cancellation of all entries made in the statutory charges register in respect of this deed.

11 Third parties

Each party declares and confirms that with the exception of any person who becomes an Owner, Developer, Lessee, or Mortgagee of the Application Site no term of this agreement is enforceable under the Contract (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999 by a person who is not a party to this agreement.

12 Jurisdiction

Each party irrevocably agrees that the Courts of Northern Ireland shall have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with this deed or its subject matter or formation (including non-contractual disputes or claims) and that it is governed in accordance with the law of Northern Ireland.

13 Delivery

The provisions of this Deed (other than this clause which shall be of immediate effect) shall be of no effect until this Deed has been dated.

14 Disputes

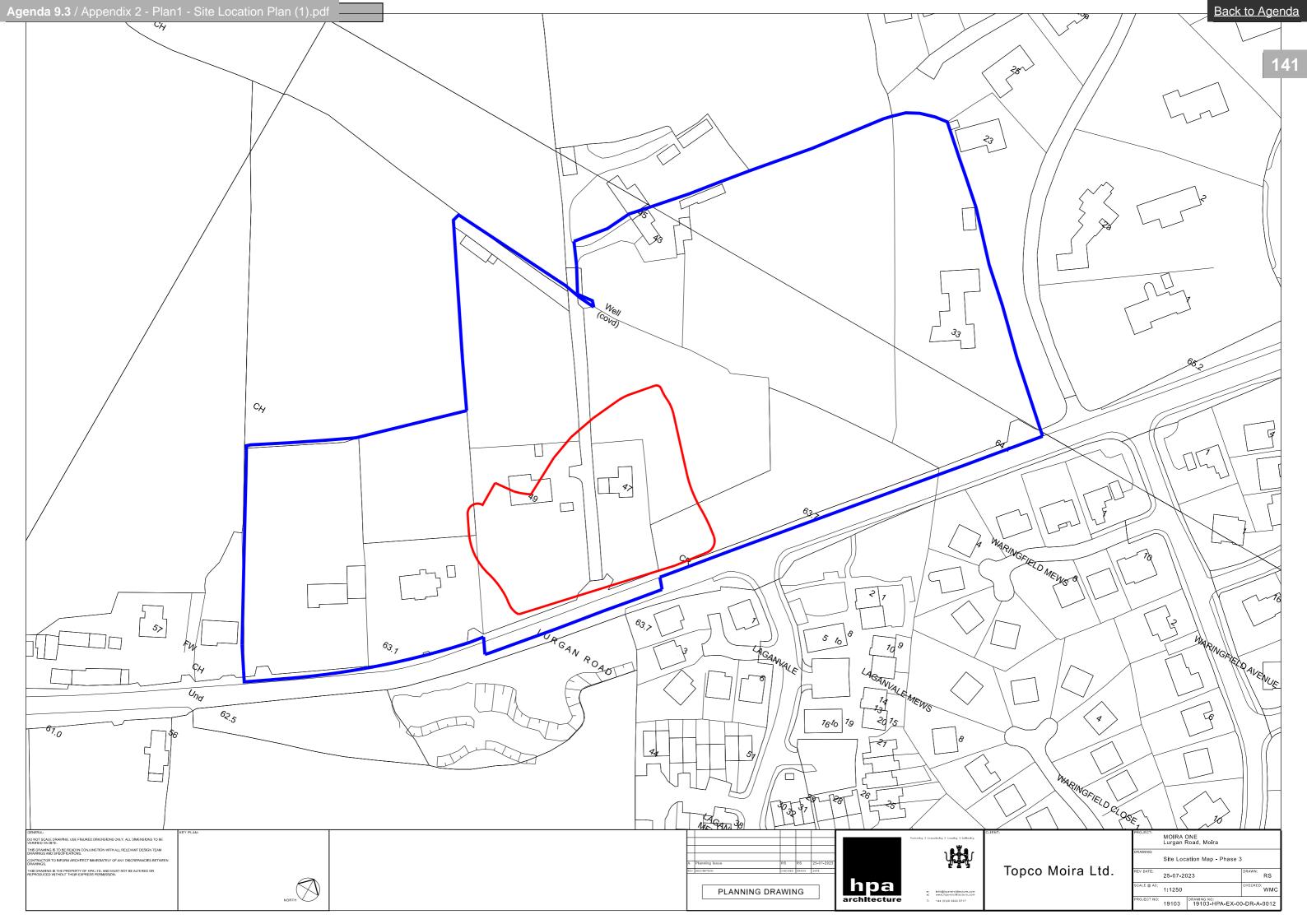

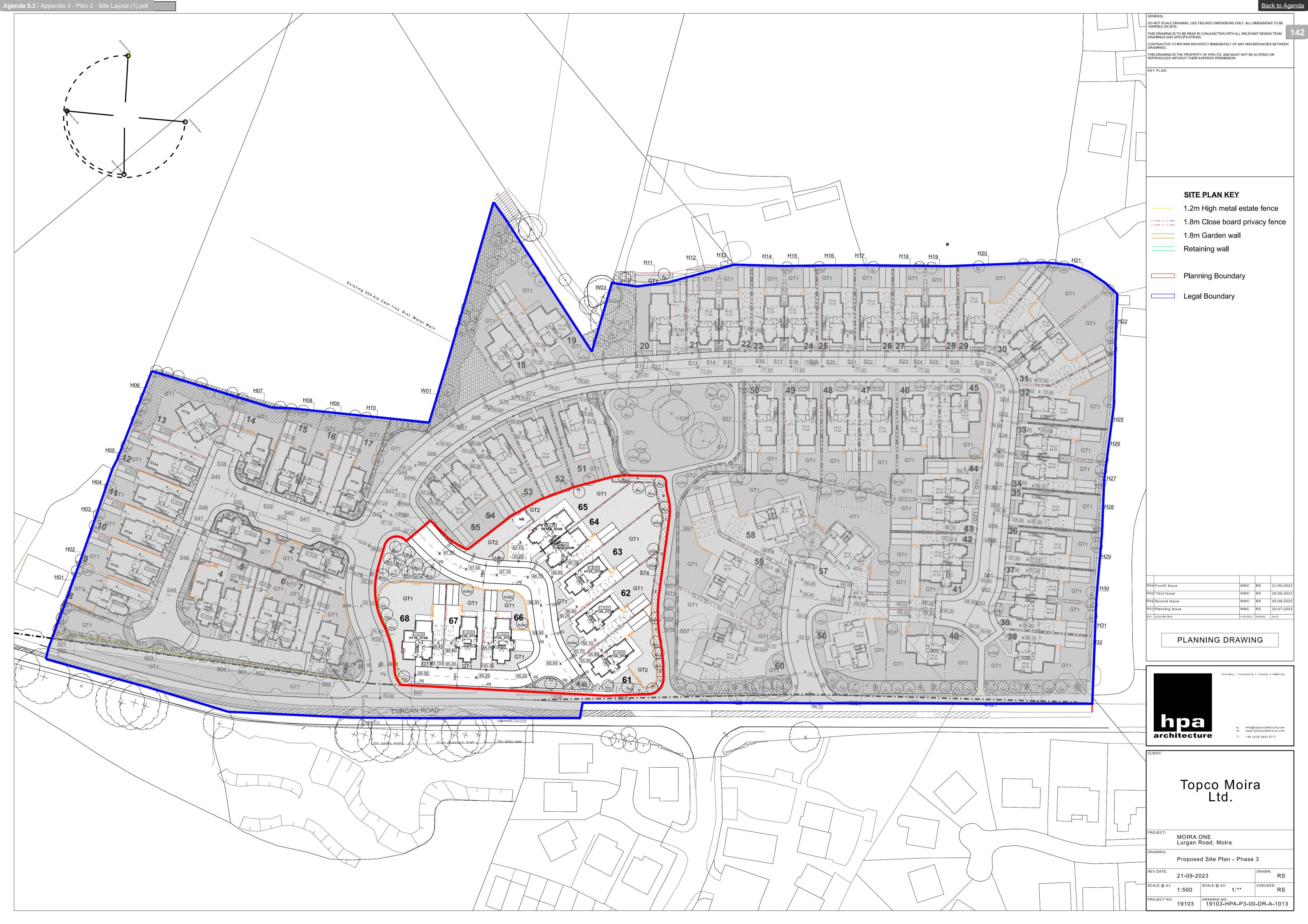

1.0 **Background**

THIS DEED is made on the day of 2024

BETWEEN

- (1) LISBURN & CASTLEREAGH CITY COUNCIL of Civic Centre, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn, BT27 4RL ("the COUNCIL");
- (2) JAVIAN LIMITED having its registered office at Unit 2 232-240 Belmont Road, Belfast, Northern Ireland, BT4 2AW (the "DEVELOPER");
- (3) CHOICE HOUSING ASSOCIATION (RELAND LIMITED having its registered office at Leslie Morrell House 37-41 May Street, Belfast BT1 4DN ("CHOICE")

BACKGROUND

- (A) The Council is the local planning authority for the purposes of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 (the Planning Act) for the area in which the Mealough Land is situated.
- (B) The Developer is the owner of the Mealough Land.
- (C) Choice is the owner and developer of the Choice Land.
- (D) The Council has granted approval for the Previous Mealough Planning Application.
- (E) The Council has granted the Choice Planning Approval.
- (F) The Council and the Developer and another party have entered into the Previous Planning Agreement
- (G) The Developer has proposed a revised development for the Mealough Land and submitted the Mealough Land Planning Application Incorporating Affordable Housing (MLPAIAH) (planning reference LA05/2024/0513/F).
- (H) The Council, in connection with its consideration of the MLPAIAH, having regard to the provisions of the Local Plan and to all other material considerations has required:
 - the Developer to make provision for Affordable Housing on the Mealough Land; and
 - ii. Choice to covenant only to develop the Choice Land for Affordable Housing, as essential requirements of receiving approval for the MLPAIAH.
- (I) The Council has accepted that appropriate provision for Affordable Housing on the Mealough Land in accordance with the Local Plan would be delivered if the Choice Land was developed for Affordable Housing Units Choice Land (18 units) and if 9 sites on the Mealough Land were developed as Affordable Housing.
- (J) The Council resolved at its meeting on 7th April 2025 to grant approval for the MLPAIAH, subject to the prior completion of this Agreement.

AGREED TERMS

1. INTERPRETATION

The following definitions and rules of interpretation apply in this deed:

1.1 Definitions:

"Affordable Housing"

means housing that is provided outside of the general market for those whose needs are not met by the market. Affordable housing which is funded by Government must remain affordable or alternatively there must be provision for the public subsidy to be repaid or recycled in the provision of new affordable housing and includes any of:

- a) Social Rented Housing;
- b) Intermediate Housing for Sale; or
- c) Intermediate Housing for Rent.

To include such further statutory expansion or evolution of the interpretation of this concept.

Units Choice Land"

"Affordable Housing means a minimum of 18 Residential Units to be provided for Social Rented Housing on the Choice Land

Units Mealough Land"

"Affordable Housing A minimum of 9 Residential Units to be provided for Affordable Housing within the Mealough Land within the area shaded green on the plan 1 at annex A.

"Available
Occupation'

for means together the following:

- a) available for Occupation; and
- the issuance of a Building Regulations Completion Certificate pursuant to the Building Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2012 (as amended)

"Base Rate"

the higher of 2% and the base rate from time to time of the Bank of England.

"Choice Commencement" the commencement of Development on the Choice Lands.

"Choice Land"

The land owned by Choice and situate at and outlined in red on Plan 2 at Annex A.

"Choice Planning Approval"

Planning The Planning Approval granted by the Council under reference LA05/2021/1139/F for 18 residential units on the Choice Land

"Commencement of Development" the carrying out in relation to the Development of any material operation as defined by section 63 of the Planning Act but disregarding for the purposes of this deed and for no other purpose, the following operations:

- demolition works;
- site clearance;
- ground investigations;
- site survey works;
- temporary access construction works;
- archaeological investigation; and
- erection of any fences and hoardings around the Property.

Commence, Commenced and Commences shall be construed accordingly.

"Commencement Date"

the date the Commencement of Development occurs.

"Deed of Variation"

a deed varying the Previous Planning Agreement made under section 76 of the Planning Act in the form appended hereto at Annex B.

"Default Rate"

Interest 2% per annum above the Base Rate.

"Intermediate Housing"

means those Residential Units which shall be co-ownership, shared ownership or Intermediate Housing for Rent or such other product to be agreed in writing by the Council. Intermediate Housing means housing that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rents and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

"Intermediate Housing for Rent"

means housing delivered by a Registered Housing Association that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rent and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

"Local Plan"

Lisburn and Castlereagh Local Development Plan 2032.

"Mealough Development" the development of the Mealough Land authorised by the Mealough Planning Permission.

"Mealough Land"

the land owned by the Developer and situate at Mealough Road, Carryduff and shown edged red on Plan 1 at Annex A.

"Mealough Land Planning Application

Incorporating Affordable Housing the application for full planning permission on the Mealough Land submitted to the Council and assigned reference LA05/2024/0513/F and which makes provision for 9 Affordable Residential Units on the Mealough Land

MLPAIAH"

Permission"

"Mealough Planning the planning permission resolved to be issued by the Planning Committee of the Council on foot of the MLPAIAH.

"Occupation"

actual occupation of any Residential Unit at the Development but shall not include occupation for the purposes of construction or fitting out or for marketing purposes or for any substation leases granted to NIE. Occupy and Occupied shall be construed accordingly.

"Previous Mealough Planning Application"

The planning application submitted under reference LA05/2023/0292/F for which the Council granted approval on 4th April 2024

"Previous Planning Agreement"

the planning agreement made under section 76 of the Planning Act between the Developer, Fraser Homes Limited and the Council dated 4th April 2024 and related to the Previous Mealough Planning Application

"Residential Unit"

a building or part of a building constructed pursuant to the Planning Permission intended for use as a separate dwelling in the occupation of one household and which shall include, without prejudice to the generality for the foregoing, an apartment, a maisonette, a semi-detached dwelling, a town house or terrace property or a detached dwelling house.

"Social Rented Housing"

those Residential Units to be provided at an affordable rent by a Registered Housing Association made available to households in housing need and offered in accordance with the common selection scheme administered by NIHE which prioritises households living in unsuitable or insecure accommodation.

"VAT"

value added tax chargeable under the Value Added Tax Act 1994 and any similar replacement tax and any similar additional tax.

"Working Day"

any day which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, a bank holiday or a public

holiday in Northern Ireland.

- 1.2 Clause headings shall not affect the interpretation of this deed.
- 1.3 A person includes a natural person, corporate or unincorporated body (whether or not having separate legal personality).
- 1.4 A reference to a company shall include any company, corporation or other body corporate, wherever and however incorporated or established.
- Unless the context otherwise requires, words in the singular shall include the plural and in the plural shall include the singular.
- 1.6 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to one gender shall include a reference to the other genders.

- 1.7 A reference to any party shall include that party's personal representatives, successors and permitted assigns and in the case of the Council the successors to its respective statutory functions.
- 1.8 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to a statute or statutory provision is a reference to it as amended, extended or re-enacted from time to time.
- 1.9 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to a statute or statutory provision shall include any subordinate legislation made from time to time under that statute or statutory provision.
- 1.10 A reference to writing or written excludes faxes and e-mail.
- 1.11 A reference to this deed or to any other deed or document referred to in this deed is a reference to this deed or such other deed or document as varied or novated (in each case, other than in breach of the provisions of this deed) from time to time.
- 1.12 References to clauses and Schedules are to the clauses and Schedules of this deed.
- 1.13 An obligation on a party not to do something includes an obligation not to allow that thing to be done.
- 1.14 Any words following the terms including, include, in particular, for example or any similar expression shall be construed as illustrative and shall not limit the sense of the words, description, definition, phrase or term preceding those terms.
- 1.15 Where an obligation falls to be performed by more than one person, the obligation can be enforced against every person so bound jointly and against each of them individually.

STATUTORY PROVISIONS

- 2.1 This deed constitutes a planning agreement for the purposes of section 76 of the Planning Act.
- 2.2 The covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in this deed are planning obligations for the purposes of section 76 of the Planning Act and are entered into by the Developer, in the knowledge that they bind the Mealough Land and by Choice in the knowledge that they bind the Choice Land.
- 2.3 The covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in this deed are enforceable by the Council in accordance with section 76 of the Planning Act.
- Insofar as any of the covenants, restrictions or obligations contained in this deed are not planning obligations within the meaning of the Planning Act, they are entered into freely by the Council, and the Developer pursuant to Article 8 of The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 2002, Article 79 of the Local Government Act (Northern Ireland) 2014 and all other enabling powers with the intention that they bind the interests held by the Developer in the Mealough Land, and their successors and assigns and bind the interests held by Choice in the Choice Land and their successors and assigns.
- 2.5 Wherever there is more than one person named as a party and where more than one party undertakes an obligation all their obligations can be enforced against all of them jointly and severally and against each individually unless there is an express provision otherwise.

CONDITIONALITY

3.1 All obligations contained within this deed shall come into effect and bind the Mealough Land and the Choice Land from the date of grant of the Mealough Planning Permission.

COVENANTS TO THE COUNCIL AND COVENANTS BY THE COUNCIL

- 4.1 The Developer covenants with the Council to observe and perform the covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in Schedule 1 Part 1.
- 4.2 Choice covenants with the Council to observe and perform the covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in Schedule 1 Part 2.
- 4.3 The Council covenants with the Developer that it shall;
 immediately upon the execution of this agreement issue the Mealough Planning Permission.

RELEASE

No person shall be liable for any breach of a covenant, restriction or obligation contained in this deed after parting with all of its interest in the Mealough Land or the Choice Land except in respect of any breach subsisting prior to parting with such interest.

6. PREVIOUS PLANNING AGREEMENT

The parties agree and declare that the terms of the Previous Planning Agreement, except as varied by the Deed of Variation, are confirmed as if the same were set out in this Deed in full, and that such terms as so varied shall for all purposes be deemed incorporated in this Deed in accordance with section 77 of the Planning Act.

DETERMINATION OF DEED

- 7.1 The obligations in this deed (with the exception of clause 8) shall cease to have effect if before the Commencement of Development, the Mealough Planning Permission:
 - 7.1.1 expires;
 - 7.1.2 is varied or revoked other than at the request of the Developer; or

7.1.3 is quashed following a successful legal challenge (including on foot of an application for judicial review pursuant to Order 53 of The Rules of the Court of Judicature (NI) 1980).

STATUTORY CHARGE

This deed shall be registered as a statutory charge in the statutory charges register pursuant to section 245 of the Planning Act.

COUNCIL'S COSTS

- 9.1 The Developer shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed the Council's reasonable and proper legal costs together with all disbursements incurred in connection with the negotiation, completion and registration of this deed.
- 9.2 The Developer shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed a fee of £500 as a contribution towards the Council's costs of monitoring the implementation of this Deed.

10. INTEREST ON LATE PAYMENT

If any sum or amount has not been paid to the Council by the date it is due under this deed, the Developer shall pay the Council interest on that amount at the Default Interest Rate (both before and after any judgment). Such interest shall accrue on a daily basis for the period from the due date to and including the date of payment.

OWNERSHIP

The Developer warrants that no person other than the Developer has any legal or equitable interest in the Mealough Land.

REASONABLENESS

Any approval, consent, direction, authority, agreement or action to be given by the Council under this deed shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

CANCELLATION OF ENTRIES

If this deed is determined pursuant to clause 6 (and subject to the payment of the Council's reasonable and proper costs and charges) the Council will on the written request of the Developer or any successors in title cancel all entries made in the statutory charges register in respect of this deed.

DISPUTES

Any dispute or difference arising between the parties with regard to their respective rights and obligations as to any matter or thing in any way arising out of or connected with the Deed will, except as otherwise expressly provided, be referred to the Courts of Northern Ireland for final determination and the parties agree that the courts of Northern Ireland shall have exclusive jurisdiction in respect of all matters under or in connection with this Deed.

NO FETTER OF DISCRETION

Nothing (contained or implied) in this deed shall fetter or restrict the Council's statutory rights, powers, discretions and responsibilities. In particular, nothing in this deed shall fetter the powers of the Council under the Planning Act relating to its determination of any planning application lodged in the future relating to the Mealough Land.

WAIVER

No failure or delay by the Council to exercise any right or remedy provided under this deed or by law shall constitute a waiver of that or any other right or remedy. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy.

17. FUTURE PERMISSIONS

- 17.1 This deed, to the extent outlined in the First Schedule, restricts the use of the Mealough Land, to the extent outlined in First Schedule, in perpetuity in accordance with Section 76 of the Planning Act unless otherwise agreed by amendment to this deed in accordance with the Planning Act.
- 17.2 Nothing in this deed shall prohibit or limit the right to develop any part of the Mealough Land in accordance with any planning permission granted after the date of the Mealough Planning Permission.

AGREEMENTS AND DECLARATIONS

18.1 The parties agree that:

- 18.1.1 nothing in this deed (including the covenants contained within Schedule 1 to this deed) constitutes a planning permission or an obligation to grant planning permission; and
- 18.1.2 nothing in this deed grants planning permission or any other approval, consent or permission required from the Council in the exercise of any other statutory function.

NOTICES

- 19.1 Any notice or other communication to be given under this deed must be in writing and must be:
 - 19.1.1 delivered by hand; or
 - 19.1.2 sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service.
- 19.2 Any notice or other communication to be given under this deed must be sent to the relevant party as follows:
 - 19.2.1 to the Council at the Council's Civic Headquarters, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn, BT274RL marked for the attention of the Head of Planning and Capital Development;
 - 19.2.2 to the Developer at the address shown in this agreement; and

or as otherwise specified by the relevant party by notice in writing to each other party.

- 19.3 Any notice or other communication given in accordance with clause 18.1 and clause 18.2 will be deemed to have been received:
 - if delivered by hand, on signature of a delivery receipt provided that if delivery occurs before 9.00 am on a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on that day, and if delivery occurs after 5.00 pm on a Working Day, or on a day which is not a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on the next Working Day; or
 - 19.3.2 if sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service, at 9 a.m. on the second Working Day after posting.
- 19.4 This clause does not apply to the service of any proceedings or other documents in any legal action or, where applicable, any arbitration or other method of dispute resolution.

THIRD PARTY RIGHTS

A person who is not a party to this deed shall not have any rights under the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999 to enforce any term of this deed.

GOVERNING LAW

This deed and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with it or its subject matter or formation (including non-contractual disputes or claims) shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the law of Northern Ireland.

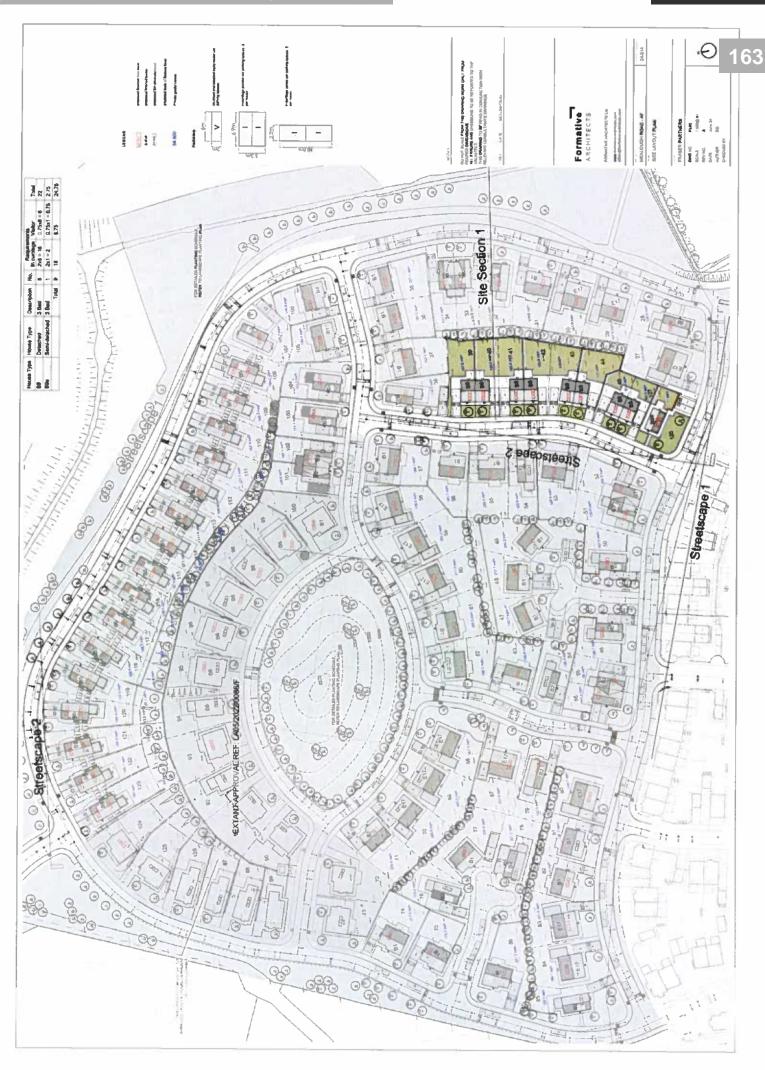

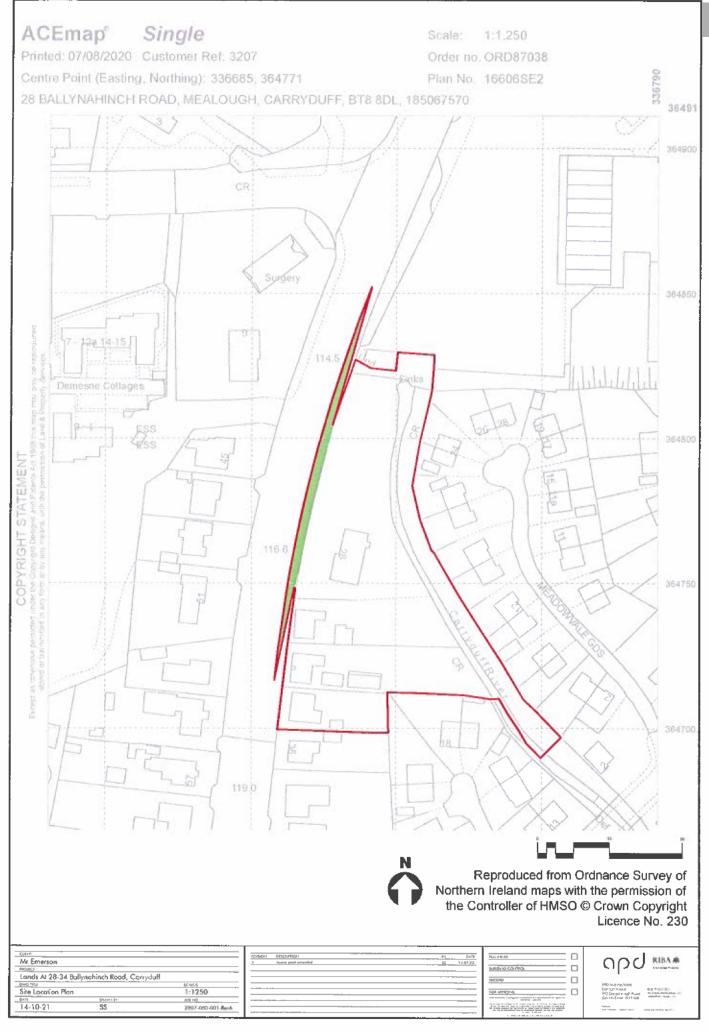

- (C) Choice is the registered owner of the land in Folios 39240, DN242940, DN111218, DN161322, DN226345, DN239321 and DN260769 County Down.
- (D) The Parties have agreed pursuant to s.77(1)(a) of the Act that the Planning Agreement shall be modified as set out in this Deed.

THIS DEED WITNESSES:

1. INTERPRETATION

1.1 In this Deed (including the Background) the following expressions shall have the following meanings:

9.1 The Developer shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed the Council's reasonable, proper legal costs together with all disbursements incurred in connection with the negotiation, completion and registration of this deed.

- (1) LISBURN & CASTLEREAGH CITY COUNCIL of Civic Centre, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn, BT27 4RL ("the COUNCIL");
- (2) JAVIAN LIMITED having its registered office at Unit 2 232-240 Belmont Road, Belfast, Northern Ireland, BT4 2AW (the "DEVELOPER");
- (3) Fraser Homes Limited having its registered office at 72-74 Omagh Road, Dromore, Omagh, Northern Ireland, BT78 3AJ ("Homes")

BACKGROUND

- (A) The Council is the local planning authority for the purposes of the Planning Act (Northern Ireland) 2011 for the area in which the Mealough Land is situated.
- (B) The Developer is the owner of the Mealough Land.
- (C) The Developer has made the Mealough Planning Application and is proposing to carry out the development of the Mealough Land in accordance with the Mealough Planning Permission.
- (D) The Council having regard to the provisions of the Local Plan and to all other material considerations has required the Developer to make provision for affordable housing within the Mealough Land for a total of 17 Residential Units
- (E) The Council resolved at its meeting on 26131204 to grant approval for the Mealough Land Planning Application, subject to the prior completion of this agreement.
- (F) Homes has a charge over part of the Mealough Land and consents and agrees to this agreement.

AGREED TERMS

1. INTERPRETATION

The following definitions and rules of interpretation apply in this deed:

1.1 Definitions:

"Affordable Housing"

means housing that is provided outside of the general market for those whose needs are not met by the market. Affordable housing which is funded by Government must remain affordable or alternatively there must be provision for the public subsidy to be repaid or recycled in the provision of new affordable housing and includes any of:

a) Social Rented Housing;

- b) Intermediate Housing for Sale; or
- c) Intermediate Housing for Rent.

"Affordable Housing means an application for planning approval for Affordable Housing Application" on the Mealough Land

"Affordable Housing means the planning permission resolved to be issued by the planning Permission"

"Affordable Housing A minimum of 17 Residential Units to be provided for Affordable Units"

a) available for Occupation; and

- b) the issuance of a Building Regulations Completion Certificate pursuant to the Building Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2012
- "Base Rate"

 the higher of 2% and the base rate from time to time of the Bank of England.
- "Commencement of the carrying out in relation to the Development of any material operation as defined by section 63 of the Planning Act but disregarding for the purposes of this deed and for no other purpose, the following operations:
 - demolition works:
 - site clearance;
 - ground investigations;
 - site survey works;
 - temporary access construction works;





- archaeological investigation; and
- erection of any fences and hoardings around the Property.

Commence, Commenced and Commences shall be construed accordingly.

"Commencement Date*

the date the Commencement of Development occurs.

"Default Rate*

Interest 2% per annum above the Base Rate.

"Development"

the development of the Mealough Land authorised by the Mealough Planning Permission.

"intermediate Housing"

means those Residential Units which shall be co-ownership, shared ownership or Intermediate Housing for Rent or such other product to be agreed in writing by the Council. Intermediate Housing means housing that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rents and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

"Intermediate Housing for Rent" means housing delivered by a Registered Housing Association that is made available at a cost lower than private market rent but higher than social rented housing rent, usually at a set percentage below prevailing local market rent and usually only made available to prospective tenants based on the household's total income or the proportion of the total income likely to be spent on housing costs.

"Local Plan"

Development means the Lisburn & Castlereagh Local Development Plan 2032.

"Mealough Land"

the land owned by the Developer and situate at Mealough Road, Carryduff and shown edged red on Plan 1 at Annex A.

"Mealough Land Planning Application"	the application for full planning permission on the Mealough Land submitted to the Council and assigned reference LA05/2023/0292/F
"Mealough Planning Permission"	the planning permission resolved to be issued by the Planning Committee of the Council on foot of the Mealough Land Planning Application.
"Occupation"	Actual occupation of any Residential Unit at the Development but shall not include occupation for the purposes of construction or fitting out or for marketing purposes or for any substation leases granted to NIE. Occupy and Occupied shall be construed accordingly.
"Residential Unit"	a building or part of a building constructed pursuant to the Planning Permission intended for use as a separate dwelling in the occupation of one household and which shall include, without prejudice to the generality for the foregoing, an apartment, a maisonette, a semi-detached dwelling, a town house or terrace property or a detached dwelling house.
"Social Rented Housing"	those Residential Units to be provided at an affordable rent by a Registered Housing Association made available to households in housing need and offered in accordance with the common selection scheme administered by NIHE which prioritises households living in unsuitable or insecure accommodation.
"VAT"	value added tax chargeable under the Value Added Tax Act 1994 and any similar replacement tax and any similar additional tax.
"Working Day"	any day which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, a bank holiday or a public holiday in Northern Ireland.

- 1.2 Clause headings shall not affect the interpretation of this deed.
- 1.3 A person includes a natural person, corporate or unincorporated body (whether or not having separate legal personality).
- 1.4 A reference to a company shall include any company, corporation or other body corporate, wherever and however incorporated or established.
- 1.5 Unless the context otherwise requires, words in the singular shall include the plural and in the plural shall include the singular.
- 1.6 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to one gender shall include a reference to the other genders.

- 1.7 A reference to any party shall include that party's personal representatives, successors and permitted assigns and in the case of the Council the successors to its respective statutory functions.
- 1.8 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to a statute or statutory provision is a reference to it as amended, extended or re-enacted from time to time.
- 1.9 Unless the context otherwise requires, a reference to a statute or statutory provision shall include any subordinate legislation made from time to time under that statute or statutory provision.
- 1.10 A reference to writing or written excludes faxes and e-mail.
- 1.11 A reference to this deed or to any other deed or document referred to in this deed is a reference to this deed or such other deed or document as varied or novated (in each case, other than in breach of the provisions of this deed) from time to time.
- 1.12 References to clauses and Schedules are to the clauses and Schedules of this deed.
- 1.13 An obligation on a party not to do something includes an obligation not to allow that thing to be done.
- 1.14 Any words following the terms including, include, in particular, for example or any similar expression shall be construed as illustrative and shall not limit the sense of the words, description, definition, phrase or term preceding those terms.
- 1.15 Where an obligation falls to be performed by more than one person, the obligation can be enforced against every person so bound jointly and against each of them individually.

2. STATUTORY PROVISIONS

- 2.1 This deed constitutes a planning agreement for the purposes of section 76 of the Planning Act.
- 2.2 The covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in this deed are planning obligations for the purposes of section 76 of the Planning Act and are entered into by the Developer, in the knowledge that they bind the Mealough Land.
- 2.3 The covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in this deed are enforceable by the Council in accordance with section 76 of the Planning Act.
- 2.4 Insofar as any of the covenants, restrictions or obligations contained in this deed are not planning obligations within the meaning of the Planning Act, they are entered into freely by the Council, and the Developer pursuant to Article 8 of The Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) (Northern Ireland) Order 2002, Article 79 of the Local Government Act (Northern Ireland) 2014 and all other enabling powers with the intention that they bind the interests held by the Developer in the Mealough Land, and their successors and assigns.

CONDITIONALITY

3.1 All obligations contained within this deed shall come into effect and bind the Mealough Land from the date of grant of the Mealough Planning Permission.

3.2 Homes consents to the terms of this Deed Provided That Homes shall not be liable for any breach of the obligations in this Deed unless committed or continuing when Homes is in possession of that part of the Mealough Land over which Homes has a charge.

COVENANTS TO THE COUNCIL AND COVENANTS BY THE COUNCIL

- 4.1 The Developer covenants with the Council to observe and perform the covenants, restrictions and obligations contained in Schedule 1.
- 4.2 The Council covenants with the Developer that it shall;

immediately upon the execution of this agreement issue the Mealough Planning Permission and

expeditiously and efficiently process the Affordable Housing Application.

RELEASE

No person shall be liable for any breach of a covenant, restriction or obligation contained in this deed after parting with all of its interest in the Mealough Land except in respect of any breach subsisting prior to parting with such interest.

DETERMINATION OF DEED

- 6.1 The obligations in this deed (with the exception of clause 8) shall cease to have effect if before the Commencement of Development, the Mealough Planning Permission:
 - 6.1.1 expires;
 - 6.1.2 Is varied or revoked other than at the request of the Developer; or
 - 6.1.3 is quashed following a successful legal challenge (including on foot of an application for judicial review pursuant to Order 53 of The Rules of the Court of Judicature (NI) 1980).

STATUTORY CHARGE

This deed shall be registered as a statutory charge in the statutory charges register pursuant to section 245 of the Planning Act.

COUNCIL'S COSTS

- 8.1 The Developer shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed the Council's reasonable and proper legal costs together with all disbursements incurred in connection with the negotiation, completion and registration of this deed.
- 8.2 The Developer shall pay to the Council on or before the date of this deed a fee of £5000 as a contribution towards the Council's costs of monitoring the implementation of this Deed.

INTEREST ON LATE PAYMENT

If any sum or amount has not been paid to the Council by the date it is due under this deed, the Developer shall pay the Council interest on that amount at the Default Interest Rate (both before and after any judgment). Such interest shall accrue on a daily basis for the period from the due date to and including the date of payment.

OWNERSHIP

The Developer warrants that no person other than the Developer and Homes has any legal or equitable interest in the Mealough Land.

REASONABLENESS

Any approval, consent, direction, authority, agreement or action to be given by the Council under this deed shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

CANCELLATION OF ENTRIES

If this deed is determined pursuant to clause 6 (and subject to the payment of the Council's reasonable and proper costs and charges) the Council will on the written request of the Developer or any successors in title cancel all entries made in the statutory charges register in respect of this deed.

DISPUTES

Any dispute or difference arising between the parties with regard to their respective rights and obligations as to any matter or thing in any way arising out of or connected with the Deed will, except as otherwise expressly provided, be referred to the Courts of Northern Ireland for final determination and the parties agree that the courts of Northern Ireland shall have exclusive jurisdiction in respect of all matters under or in connection with this Deed.

14. NO FETTER OF DISCRETION

Nothing (contained or implied) in this deed shall fetter or restrict the Council's statutory rights, powers, discretions and responsibilities. In particular, nothing in this deed shall fetter

the powers of the Council under the Planning Act relating to its determination of any planning application lodged in the future relating to the Mealough Land.

WAIVER

No failure or delay by the Council to exercise any right or remedy provided under this deed or by law shall constitute a waiver of that or any other right or remedy. No single or partial exercise of such right or remedy shall prevent or restrict the further exercise of that or any other right or remedy.

16. FUTURE PERMISSIONS

- This deed, to the extent outlined in the First Schedule, restricts the use of the Mealough Land, to the extent outlined in First Schedule, in perpetuity in accordance with Section 76 of the Planning Act unless otherwise agreed by amendment to this deed in accordance with the Planning Act.
- 16.2 Nothing in this deed shall prohibit or limit the right to develop any part of the Mealough Land in accordance with any planning permission granted after the date of the Mealough Planning Permission.

AGREEMENTS AND DECLARATIONS

17.1 The parties agree that:

- 17.1.1 nothing in this deed (including the covenants contained within Schedule 1 to this deed) constitutes a planning permission or an obligation to grant planning permission; and
- 17.1.2 nothing in this deed grants planning permission or any other approval, consent or permission required from the Council in the exercise of any other statutory function.

NOTICES

- 18.1 Any notice or other communication to be given under this deed must be in writing and must be:
 - 18.1.1 delivered by hand; or
 - 18.1.2 sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service.
- 18.2 Any notice or other communication to be given under this deed must be sent to the relevant party as follows:
 - 18.2.1 to the Council at the Council's Civic Headquarters, Lagan Valley Island, Lisburn, BT27 4RL marked for the attention of the Head of Planning;

- 18.2.2 to the Developer at the address shown in this agreement; and or as otherwise specified by the relevant party by notice in writing to each other party.
- 18.3 Any notice or other communication given in accordance with clause 18.1 and clause 18.2 will be deemed to have been received:
 - if delivered by hand, on signature of a delivery receipt provided that if delivery occurs before 9.00 am on a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on that day, and if delivery occurs after 5.00 pm on a Working Day, or on a day which is not a Working Day, the notice will be deemed to have been received at 9.00 am on the next Working Day; or
 - 18.3.2 if sent by pre-paid first class post or other next working day delivery service, at 9 a.m. on the second Working Day after posting.
- 18.4 This clause does not apply to the service of any proceedings or other documents in any legal action or, where applicable, any arbitration or other method of dispute resolution.

THIRD PARTY RIGHTS

A person who is not a party to this deed shall not have any rights under the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999 to enforce any term of this deed.

20. VALUE ADDED TAX

20.1 Each amount stated to be payable by the Council, or the Developer to the other under or pursuant to this deed is exclusive of VAT (if any).

21. GOVERNING LAW

This deed and any dispute or claim arising out of or in connection with it or its subject matter or formation (including non-contractual disputes or claims) shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the law of Northern Ireland.

This document has been executed as a deed and is delivered and takes effect on the date stated at the beginning of it.

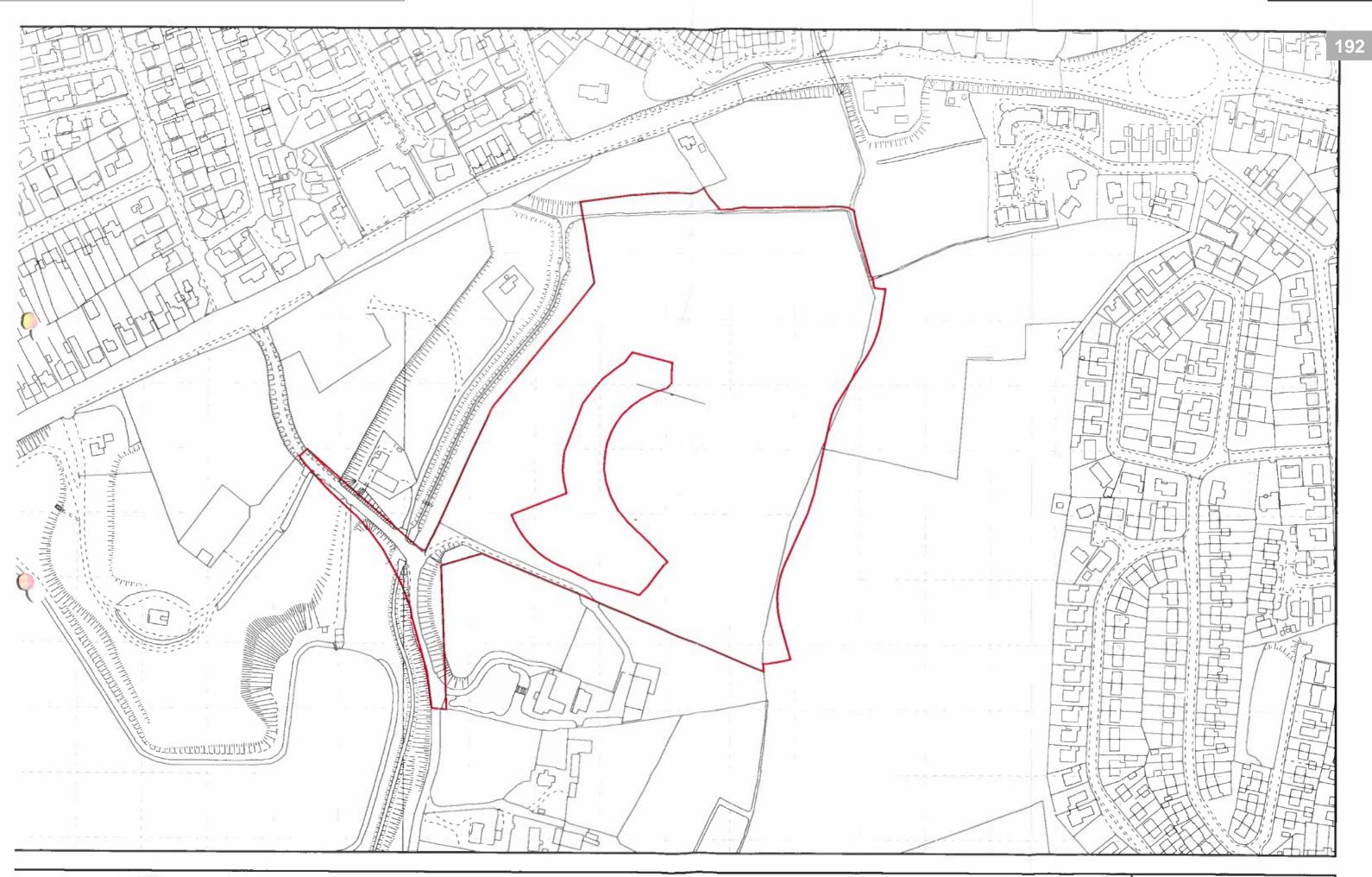

1.0 **Background and Key Issues** 1.1 This report aims to set out the facts, from a council perspective, in the case of the abandoned dog, known as Max (attached at Appendix 1). Max was found on 5 December 2024 on the Comber Greenway in Dundonald and brought 1.2 into a local veterinary practice on 6 December 2024. While the dog's microchip provided details of the registered keeper, he advised that he was no longer the owner of the dog as he had sold him to someone whom he did not have the details for. Council seized the dog in accordance with the legislation and subsequently deemed it to be a banned breed, namely a Pit Bull Terrier Type. 1.3 There was significant challenge in this case from an animal charity, a person who applied for standing in the legal case and a high-profile social media lobby. While Elected Members have been kept up to date at all stages, there were limitations to 1.4

information that could be shared due to on-going legal proceedings which included

exempted information. Section 32 of the Freedom of Information Act provides an exemption for documents being held for the purposes of court proceedings (civil and criminal). The reports were to be relied upon by the Council in the court proceedings.

- 1.5 Now that the case has concluded and Max has been re-homed with his new owner, the council is in a position to provide a report which includes detail on the following:
 - the legislative context and duty of council in respect of stray dogs, including banned breeds;
 - the chronology of events which stemmed from Max being in the care of the council which includes:
 - the council's officers carrying out an assessment to determine Max as a Pit Bull Terrier Type i.e. banned breed;
 - the appointment of two further assessors to determine type;
 - interactions with third party organisations, including the central government department with legislative responsibility;
 - application by a third party to have legal 'standing' in the case; and
 - outcome of the council's application to the court to have Max typed as a banned breed and rehome him subject to the conditions of a Contingent Destruction Order
 - the significant public attention and social media lobby;
 - costs incurred by the council in bringing this case forward including legal, kennelling, veterinary care, third party assessments and behaviouralist intervention;
 - summary; and
 - Key outcomes including lessons learned.

Section 32 of the Freedom of Information Act provides an exemption for documents being held for the purposes of court proceedings (civil and criminal). The reports, in this case were to be relied upon by the council in the court proceedings. Now that the case has concluded, this report is presented to include details on the following:
 - the legislative context and duty of council in respect of stray dogs, including banned breeds;
 - the chronology of events which stemmed from Max being in the care of the council which includes:
 - the council's officers carrying out an assessment to determine Max as a Pit Bull Terrier Type i.e. banned breed;
 - the appointment of two further assessors to determine type;
 - interactions with third party organisations, including the government department with legislative responsibility;
 - application by a third party to have legal 'standing' in the case; and
 - outcome of the council's application to the court to have Max typed as a banned breed and rehome him subject to the conditions of a Contingent Destruction Order
 - the significant public attention and social media lobby;
 - costs incurred by the council in bringing this case forward including legal, kennelling, veterinary care, third party assessments and behaviouralist intervention;
 - summary; and
 - key outcomes including lessons learned.

2.0 Legislative Context

2.1 The legislative remit of local authorities to enforce the law on the control of dogs which includes the seizure of stray dogs in Northern Ireland is contained in the Dogs (NI) Order 1983 ('the Order') and various orders and regulations made under the Order.

- **2.2** To this end, councils are required by the Order to establish dog warden services funded through the dog licensing system. The Order has been amended a number of times, most recently by the Dogs (Amendment) Act 2011. Where difficulties arise, councils and their officers should take advice from its own legal services (this is set out in the guidance notes of The Dogs (Northern Ireland) Order 1983 (as amended) Guidance Document 2024). The Department for Agriculture, Environment & Rural Affairs (DAERA) officials were requested to provide advice/interpretation on the Order in this case but refused and referred council to seek its own legal advice.
- **2.3** Under Article 23 of the Order, the following applies:
- 23. (1) An officer may seize any dog which is a stray dog.
- (2) A dog seized under paragraph (1) may be taken to a dog pound and may be detained by the district council by which the pound is maintained or used under arrangements made under Article 40(a) until the keeper has claimed it and paid all expenses incurred by reason of its detention (including the costs of any veterinary treatment provided under paragraph (5)).
- (3) Where—
- (a) any dog seized under paragraph (1) has been detained for 5 days after the seizure and the keeper has not claimed the dog; or
- (b) the keeper has not paid the expenses such as are mentioned in paragraph (2) within such period as the district council may determine, being a period in addition to the 5 days mentioned in sub-paragraph (a);

the council may cause the dog to be sold or to be destroyed in such a manner as to cause as little pain as possible.

- **2.4** In respect of banned breeds, the relevant article of the Dogs (Northern Ireland) Order 1983 states:
- 25A.—(1) This Article applies to—
- (a) any dog of the type known as the pit bull terrier;
- (b)any dog of the type known as the Japanese tosa; and
- (c) any dog of any type designated for the purposes of this Article by an order of the Department, being a type appearing to the Department to be bred for fighting or to have the characteristics of a type bred for that purpose.
- (2) No person shall—
- (a)breed, or breed from, a dog to which this Article applies;
- (b)sell or exchange such a dog or offer, advertise or expose such a dog for sale or exchange;

- (c)make or offer to make a gift of such a dog or advertise or expose such a dog as a gift;
- (d)cause or permit such a dog of which he is the keeper or of which he is for the time being in charge to be in a public place unless the dog is muzzled and kept on a lead; or
- (e) abandon such a dog of which he is the keeper or, being the keeper or for the time being in charge of such a dog, permit it to stray.
- (3) After 30th November 1991 no person shall have any dog to which this Article applies in his possession or custody except—
- (a)in pursuance of a power of seizure conferred by this Order; or
- (b)in accordance with an order for its destruction made under this Order;

but the Department shall by order make a scheme for the payment to the keepers of such dogs who arrange for them to be destroyed before that date of sums specified in or determined under the scheme in respect of those dogs and the cost of their destruction.

25C—(1) An officer may seize—

- (a) any dog which appears to him to be a dog to which Article 25A applies and which is in a public place—
- (i)after the time when possession or custody of it has become unlawful by virtue of that Article; or
- (ii)before that time, without being muzzled and kept on a lead;
- (b) any dog in a public place which appears to him to be a dog to which an order under Article 25B applies and in respect of which an offence against the order has been or is being committed; and
- (c) any dog in a public place (whether or not one to which that Article or such an order applies) which appears to him to be attacking any person.
- (2) If a resident magistrate is satisfied by complaint on oath that there are reasonable grounds for believing—
- (a)that an offence under Article 25A, or 33A(4) or an order under Article 25B is being or has been committed; or
- (b)that evidence of the commission of any such offence is to be found,

on any premises he may issue a warrant under his hand authorising an officer to enter those premises and to search them and seize any dog or other thing found there which is evidence of the commission of such an offence.

(3) Where a dog is seized under paragraph (1) or (2) and it appears to a resident magistrate that no person has been or is to be prosecuted for an offence mentioned in paragraph (2)(a) in respect of that dog (whether because the keeper cannot be found or for any other reason) the district judge (magistrates' court) may order the destruction of the dog and shall do so unless satisfied that the dog will not be a danger to the public.

(4) If—

- (a)the dog is one to which Article 25A applies,
- (b)the district judge (magistrates' court) does not order the destruction of the dog under paragraph (3), and
- (c)the dog is subject to the prohibition in Article 25A (3),

the district judge (magistrates' court) shall order that, unless the dog is exempted from the prohibition in Article 25A(3) within the period of two months beginning with the date of the order, the dog shall be destroyed.

- **2.5** In April 2015, the Environmental Services Committee of the council agreed Enforcement Guidelines for Officers which included:
- 15.0 Possession of an illegal breed It is the policy of the Council where an offence has been committed under Article 25 (A) of the Order –
- 15.1 The dog should be impounded by formal seizure or voluntary surrender and a second informed opinion obtained to confirm the type of dog.
- 15.2 Illegal Breeds should be euthanized unless the keeper, the finder, or the owner or person in charge expresses an interest in having the dog reunited to them.
- 15.3 The incident file will be referred to the Environmental Health Manager/Head of Service for a decision with regard to instigating proceedings.
- **2.6** To summarize, the applicable articles from the legislation were applied in this case in the following order:
 - 1. Max seized under 23(1) & impounded under 23(2)
 - 2. No keeper identified at 23(3) but due to Max being typed as Pitbull Terrier Type, 25A applies. Therefore, Max cannot be rehomed without court decision and cannot be rehomed temporarily
 - 3. Only solution is to apply to court under 25C (3-4) for contingent destruction order for implementation within 2 months

3.0 Chronology of Events

- **3.1** Max was found on 5 December 2024 on the Comber Greenway in Dundonald and brought into a local veterinary practice on 6 December 2024. The dog's microchip was scanned and provided details of the registered keeper. The vet advised council officers that he contacted the registered keeper who confirmed he was not the current owner. In an attempt to trace the owner, the vet posted a notification on social media to see if anyone would come forward to claim him. Nobody came forward. At this time, the vet estimated the dog was around 4-5 months old.
- **3.2** The councils Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning Unit was contacted on 10 December and a council officer called to the vet later that day to collect the dog.
- **3.3** As no owner was identified, Max was deemed to be an abandoned dog. In line with legislation and LCCC's Enforcement Guidelines, any abandoned dog is immediately impounded; in this case Max was placed in our contracted DAERA approved kennels. The council officer who seized the dog considered that Max displayed characteristics of a banned breed (Pit Bull Terrier Type) and reported this to their line manager on return.
- **3.4** In line with the statutory provision, any stray or abandoned dog is impounded for 5 days and the council makes every effort to identify the owner. Following this period, guardianship of the dog is transferred to the council. In line with LCCC's Enforcement Guidelines 'Illegal breeds should be euthanized unless the keeper, the finder, or the owner or person in charge expresses an interest in having the dog reunited to them'. Max was preserved for a number of reasons, outwith these guidelines, due to ongoing deliberations around his ownership, campaigning through the USPCA animal charity and the ongoing challenges around his typing as a Pit Bull Terrier Type as explained later in this report.
- **3.5** DAERA guidance and current veterinary advice states that dogs should not mix freely in the confined environments of boarding establishments given the risk of injury from other dogs, disease spreading and unwanted pregnancy. As Max's medical history was not known, he received appropriate veterinary care including the necessary vaccinations.
- **3.6** Max remained in DAERA approved kennels through to the conclusion of the legal framework and was supported during this period through socialisation sessions by a professional referred by the USPCA. They visited each week except for one visit where they were on holidays. Max received expert veterinary care throughout as required.

4.0 Determination of Type

- **4.1** The council officer was instructed to carry out a formal assessment on 13 December 2024 given their opinion that Max may be a Pit Bull Terrier Type. This is not a distinct breed, but a type of dog which is identifiable through the presence of a number of physical characteristics. As such, the use of DNA testing would not determine any dog to be a Pit Bull Terrier Type as it is not a distinct breed. Two further formal visits to Max were carried on the instruction of the legal team before the commencement of the court hearing by the council officer which re-affirmed the original opinion.
- 4.2 The assessment form used was provided by the Metropolitan Police (the Metropolitan Police were chosen as they carried out the professional training of local government officers 'Advanced Prohibited Breed and Expert Witness Course' in October 2024) and was based on the defining characteristics set out in the American Pit Bull Terrier Type Conformation Standard. This assessment concluded that Max was a Pit Bull Terrier Type as he conformed to the characteristics as set out in the Pit Bull Terrier Type Examination Sheet (Appendix 2). The officers updated version, written and submitted as part of the court bundle is also attached at **Appendix 2b** (4.35 also refers). The council officer had recently undertaken the 'Advanced Prohibited Breed and Expert Witness Course' a 2-week DAERA approved and funded training course facilitated by the Metropolitan Police in October 2024. This was completed alongside officers throughout Northern Ireland. The training was comprehensive Dangerous Breeds identification (including Pit Bull Terriers and XL Bullies) and assessment training, to a competence level equivalent to Police Dog Legislation Officers. These are the officers who enforce the dangerous dog's legislation in Great Britain. This training was funded by DAERA as part of the forthcoming legislation relating to XL Bullies.
- **4.3** Further to this assessment, another council officer was requested to carry out an additional independent assessment on 16 December 2024. While there were some differences in the assessment of the characteristics, it also concluded that Max was a Pit Bull Terrier Type as he conformed to the characteristics as set out in the Pit Bull Terrier Type Examination Sheet (**Appendix 3**). The officer's revised version, submitted as part of the court bundle is also attached at **Appendix 3b** (4.35 also refers). This officer had also undertaken the same DAERA approved and paid for training facilitated by the Metropolitan Police in October 2024 as described in the above paragraph. Two further formal visits to Max were carried out on the instruction of the legal team before the commencement of the court hearing by the council officer which re-affirmed the original opinion.
- **4.4** On 17 December 2024, council was contacted by the (former) Chief Executive of USPCA. In her correspondence, which was copied to all elected members, she placed in writing the concerns of the USPCA regarding the case of Max particularly his typing as a Pit Bull Terrier Type. She requested an independent third-party

expert opinion on breed typing and animal welfare should be consulted. She referred to the 'considerable public attention the matter has drawn' and that 'it is of significant public interest to ensure that the decision made is based on thorough and accurate assessment of the dog's welfare and the circumstances surrounding the typing.' The council also received a media enquiry from Belfast Telegraph and animal charities.

- **4.5** At the council meeting held on 17 December 2024, it was agreed that a third-party assessment be sought for Max. The Chief Executive acknowledged the significant interest in the circumstances surrounding the dog and gave an assurance that he was in a safe place and that no immediate action would be taken. He was hopeful that the dog's owner would come forward and engage with council officers.
- **4.6** On 18 December 2024, the council's Environmental Health, Risk & Emergency Planning Unit received a call from Max's registered keeper. He advised that he sold Max on Gumtree approximately 6 weeks earlier as he had been fighting with his other dog. He advised that Max was born at the start of May 2024. This information was used to conclude that Max was at this time approx. 7.5 months old.
- **4.7** On 19 December 2024, a further email was received from the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA, copied to all elected members, regarding the latest statement from council on 17 December that rather than Max's assessment being delayed until he reached a minimum age of nine months, it would be carried out by an independent third party in the New Year. She expressed that she wished to seek an appropriate interim arrangement for Max through a foster carer arrangement. She further stated that a foster family had been identified through Mid Antrim Animal Sanctuary, and this person was also in the position to become the permanent legal guardian of the dog.
- **4.8** On 20 December 2024, the Acting Director of Environmental Services, responded to this email advising that the council statement she referred to reflected the councils current position including what was agreed at the council meeting on 17 December 2024 i.e. the appointment of a third-party assessor. The Acting Director also confirmed that it would be against the law to temporarily rehome Max as he had been identified as a banned breed. Section 25 A (2) b of the Order states *No person shall (b)sell or exchange such a dog or offer, advertise or expose such a dog for sale or exchange;*
- **4.9** On the 20 December 2024, council contacted the Metropolitan Police, who had facilitated the professional training of council officers in October 2024, to source a further independent expert assessor to confirm the breed of the dog. The Metropolitan Police could not assist, however placed the council in contact with a senior officer responsible for Dog Legislation in Great Britain. This senior officer agreed to put out a request to a Police Forum used by Dog Legislation Officers to see who would be available. On 10 January 2025, an officer from Merseyside Police

accepted the request and the senior officer endorsed him to complete the assessment.

- **4.10** On 13 January 2025, the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA shared details ahead of a pre-arranged meeting to take place on 15 January 2025, of three third party independent assessors.
- **4.11** A meeting took place on the 15 January with the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA, the Acting Director of Environmental Services and the Acting Head of Service. At this meeting the three criteria were agreed in respect of the qualifications required for such a task experience, employment and qualifications. The (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA noted her concern that the council had not appointed an independent assessor from the list of third-party assessors provided to the council.
- **4.12** On 15 January 2025, the officer from the Merseyside Police visited councils contracted DAERA approved kennels and completed an independent assessment of Max using the American Dog Breeders Association's confirmation standard (**Appendix 4**). The officer found that Max has substantial characteristics of the Pit Bull Terrier Type.
- **4.13** On 16 January 2025, an email was received from Stephen Tumelty Solicitor, copied to all elected members and instructed on behalf of the USPCA. He requested that the council provide an undertaking that no assessments, decision or action will be taken that will affect Max's welfare without a meeting of the elected members to discuss the instruction of one of the three independent assessors provided by the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA on the 13 January 2025. He advised injunctive relief would have to be sought in the absence of a substantive response.
- **4.14** Later that day, he further wrote to advise he was of the understanding that an assessment had been carried out the previous evening without notice to the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA. He advised he deemed the conduct unacceptable and asked for confirmation that an independent assessor would be allowed to carry out an assessment of Max before any further action or decisions are taken.
- **4.15** Elected Members received a special confidential briefing at 1pm on the 16 January confirming Max was typed as Pit Bull Terrier Type by a third assessor from the Merseyside Police. Further briefings took place on 20 January and 5 February.
- **4.16** On 17 January 2025, the Acting Director of Environmental Services acknowledged the email from Mr Tumelty received on the 16 January and advised that a response would be issued in due course. Four further emails were received that day from Mr Tumelty seeking the necessary undertaking that no decision would be made regarding Max's future.
- **4.17** On 17 January 2025, the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA wrote to the Acting Director of Environmental Services expressing her disappointment that they

had to take legal action and they remain concerned about Max's future and lack of transparency in the case. The USPCA had hoped for a fair and independent assessment to be conducted in partnership but that had not been the case. She asked the council to prioritise collaboration moving forward. This email was acknowledged by the Acting Director on the same day.

- **4.18** On 17 January 2025, the Acting Director of Environmental Services wrote to elected members to reassure them that no further action would be taken regarding Max without their further engagement. He further advised that following their briefing the previous day, the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA had been telephoned to inform her of the most up to date position. This was followed up with formal correspondence inviting the USPCA to continue to engage with council as it works to resolve the issues. Clarification was also provided that the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (DEFRA) response regarding the applicability of an organisation (charity or not for profit) becoming the legal registered owner of a prohibited dog did not apply in Northern Ireland. In this email Members were advised of a planned protest at the Civic Centre on Saturday 18th January at 16:00.
- **4.19** On 20 January 2025, the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA wrote to the Acting Director of Environmental Services, copied to all elected members, to formally request an independent assessment jointly agreed with the USPCA, selected and conducted by one of the three assessors put forward on 13 January 2025.
- **4.20** On 20 January 2025, the Acting Director of Environmental Services wrote to the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA advising that at a Member Briefing that evening, there was support for the progression of another assessment of Max's breed and they endorsed a collaborative approach with the USPCA by commissioning one of the three recommended assessors she had previously provided. Shared communications on this matter was proposed, especially given the continuing public awareness and negative commentary in relation to council officers. A statement was subsequently agreed and issued.
- **4.21** On 21 January 2025, an independent third-party assessor was appointed by council as an independent assessor regarding the breed type and behaviour of Max. They undertook their assessment on 22 January 2025 and concluded that Max did not possess a substantial number of characteristics of an American Pit Bull Terrier Type (**Appendix 5**).
- **4.22** On 23 January 2025, the Acting Director of Environmental Services and the Chief Executive, LCCC were written to by Stephen Tumelty Solicitors, seeking clarification on several matters and requesting the disclosure of the four assessment reports.
- **4.23** Three minutes later, on the same day, he further wrote to the Chief Executive, LCCC, and the Acting Director of Environmental Services advising he had submitted an application under Article 25 C (3) of The Dogs (Northern Ireland) Order 1983 and

would require assurances that Max is kept safe pending conclusion of court proceedings before the Magistrates, otherwise an injunction would be applied for ordering the council to preserve Max.

- **4.24** On 24 January 2025, the Chief Executive of LCCC, wrote to the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA confirming the fourth assessment had taken place and advising that council was currently seeking a legal opinion as to how to best navigate the next steps for the long-term wellbeing of Max. Permission was provided for the potential new owner to be able to access the kennels to spend time with Max subject to confirming that she will work collaboratively with council for the benefit of Max and she is deemed a suitable potential long-term owner. This was all subject to legal considerations, particularly, the judge's assessment that Max can be re-homed.
- **4.25** On 29 January 2025, the LCCC Chief Executive, Acting Director of Environmental Services and (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA met in person. At this meeting, the LCCC Chief Executive outlined the findings of the 4 assessments on file and a need to find a suitable, and legal, solution for Max. The decision would not be for the council to make and would have to be presented to the courts for consideration. Actions agreed were:
 - council to apply for contingent destruction order through the courts, subject to legal due diligence;
 - council to share circumstances of this case with USPCA to assist with any future lobby to government on legislative change;
 - the identified potential new owner to be given opportunity to visit Max, subject
 to the potential owner being advised of the need for us to work together, not
 against each other; recognises a court may order destruction and that visits
 do not play out on social media;
 - joint communication on any future outcome be explored;
 - council and USPCA to continue to work closely on this case; and
 - Based on these actions USPCA would consider withdrawing any threat of legal action against the council.
- **4.26** On 31 January 2025, the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA wrote to the Acting Director of Environmental Services confirming that the USPCA is not pursuing a legal challenge against the council. This was acknowledged by the Acting Director on 3 February 2025 and it was asked if the USPCA was supportive of the council seeking a contingent destruction order, exemption process and re-homing subject to court approval. The Acting Director also advised that the council had no influence in respect of the potential new owner visiting the kennels and confirmed a visit had been arranged for the 4 February 2025. The kennelling provider facilitated a small number of visits and advised council at this time that these could no longer be supported due to site specific conditions including health and safety and infection control.

4.27 On 5 February 2025, Mr S Tumelty, solicitor for the applicant and potential future owner of Max (hereafter referred to as 'the applicant'), wrote to the Chief Executive, LCCC, advising that he had submitted an application to the court which was due to be heard in February 2025. The matter was listed before District Judge, Rosie Watters on 13 February 2025, and junior counsel appeared on behalf of council. At this listing, the hearing was confirmed for 18 March with a number of areas being directed in advance which included the sharing of expert reports and the authors of the various expert reports to attend court on that date. This application was submitted under Articles 25 (C) of the Dogs (Northern Ireland) Order 1983. A similar application was submitted by council on 20 February 2025 for a Contingent Destruction Order to apply, with the ability to re-home Max subject to positive behaviour assessments. The ability of council to make this application in the context of the legislation as it was not the 'owner' of the dog was subject to lengthy interactions with our legal team and was a factor in contributing to the later submission of our application.

The applicant also wanted standing to be considered to provide her with rights over the dog. It was necessary to have this application heard first to determine 'standing' before the court could hear council's application to confirm type.

Due to the legal argument around 'standing' the date set for listing (18 February) was abandoned and the proposed new date for the hearing set for 18 March 2025.

However, it was not until 3 April 2025, that the matter was listed for review in Lisburn Magistrates Court and 2 days set aside for the hearing on 28/29 May; that suited counsel and witnesses. The judge requested that 9 May should be used in the first instance to consider 'standing' although this date needed to be confirmed with Mr Tumelty.

The hearing for 'standing' did not take place until the 30 May which was approximately 3 months after the application was submitted. Only after this was determined was the council able to have its application heard regarding type.

- **4.28** The (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA resigned from the organisation on 6 February 2025.
- **4.29** On the 9 February 2025, the Acting Director of Environmental Services wrote to the Chairman of the USPCA advising of all former engagements with the (former) Chief Executive of the USPCA and reaffirmed the desire for a collaborative approach. Ongoing communication did take place with the chairperson of the USPCA and the interim officer assigned to cover the chief executive role. The Director of Environmental Services and Head of Service met with the new Chief Executive of the USPCA following her appointment on 10 September 2025 renewing this councils commitment to work in partnership.
- **4.30** At the hearing (30 May 2025) which was to consider 'standing' only, the barrister for the applicant raised a concern while setting out their position, alleging

that changes had been made to the Dog Wardens' reports which had been submitted to the courts. Counsel for LCCC argued that this had no relevance to the issue of 'standing' and would deal with the allegation in the formal court hearing regarding type, the date for which was yet to be set. The impact of this allegation in terms of media reporting, led to misinformation and disinformation in the public domain.

- **4.31** On 13 June 2025, the judge ruled that the applicant and potential future owner of Max did not have legal standing and the council's application to confirm type should be progressed.
- **4.32** On the 17 June 2025, the date for the council's application to be heard was agreed by the judge at Lisburn Magistrates Court for 23 September 2025. This date was set as it was the soonest time that all witnesses could be available and took into consideration the summer recess of the court. The total duration for the legal process from the council's application for type was lodged in February and heard in September and the applicant's application for standing was considered, was 8 months. It was not the desire of the council to have Max housed in kennels for this duration.
- **4.33** On 26 June, the applicant lodged a Notice of Appeal to the County Court requesting a stay of the appeal until after the substantive hearing takes place in September i.e. that the Court parks the appeal until the Court decides in respect of Max's type. Counsel for LCCC saw no merit to staying an appeal and allowing the substantive hearing to proceed in circumstances where the appellant was proposing that, if they did not like the outcome of the substantive hearing, they would then reactivate their appeal and, if successful in respect of it, have the substantive hearing run all over again. The applicant's solicitor, Mr Stephen Tumelty, was written to by the council's legal team advising that an objection is raised to any proposed stay of the appeal because the rationale for seeking a stay does not stand up to scrutiny. The appeal was subsequently withdrawn on 8 September 2025.
- **4.34** During June and July there was further interactions between Mr Tumelty and our legal team and the former applicant and management at the councils DAERA approved kennels, requesting visits to Max. The kennel management reiterated that such visits could not be facilitated due to site specific restrictions and ability of staff to supervise during the visits. This was outside of the control of council.
- **4.35** On 23 September 2025, the council's application on the following grounds was heard in Lisburn Magistrates Court:
- a) establish if Max is a banned type
- b) have his dangerousness considered
- c) rehome him with his new owner (the former applicant in this case) if he is deemed not to be a danger

At this juncture, full clarification was provided by counsel to the judge regarding the allegation of falsification of records by council officers. Under full disclosure, the court was provided with all copies of the examination sheets. One council officer had updated their original sheet with amends which reflected new information that had come to light between the date of assessment and the date the statement was submitted to the courts. The other council officer had copied the information across to a new examination sheet with amends including some wording in the 'any other comments' and 'temperament throughout assessment section'. Both copies were submitted to the courts. There were NO amends to the characteristics of the dog as assessed by the officers. All four assessors were called to give evidence to the court.

- **4.36** On 2 October 2025, the court ruled that 'Max' is a banned type but can be rehomed subject to compliance with a number of standard conditions, including being insured, microchipped, muzzled when outdoors, always to be exercised on a lead, kept in a secured environment and neutered. These conditions were reliant upon the new owner meeting them within 8 weeks. This is known as a Contingent Destruction Order and the previous applicant was named as the new owner on this document issued by the court.
- **4.37** Engagement with the new owner took place and with her consent, she was placed in contact with the relevant council officers in a different council area where the dog would be resident.
- **4.38** On 6 October 2025, Max was neutered by the vet to assist in compliance with one of the conditions of exemption. The vet recommended that he remain in the kennels for 10 days until the stitches were removed and a further assessment of his wellbeing undertaken. This was completed on 16 October and arrangements made with council officers to transfer Max to his new owner's care on 17 October 2025.

5.0 Public scrutiny and Social Media Lobby

- **5.1** This case attracted significant media attention, including a bespoke lobby, due to assessments which were carried out confirming that Max possessed a number of positive indicators identifying him as a Pit Bull Terrier Type.
- **5.2** At an early stage, the Communications team updated the website and developed Frequently Asked Questions, which were reviewed at regular intervals throughout the case. Members received briefings and emails at significant junctures.
- **5.3** While the council acknowledges the right of members of the public and charitable organisations to lobby on the basis of animal welfare and the council fully respects that right, there were instances where there were direct threats made to officers of the council, including threats to attack their homes, that caused considerable distress

and impacted on their physical and mental health. It undermined their personal integrity and professionalism. These instances were reported to the police.

- **5.4** All Elected Members received ongoing correspondence from external sources regarding the matter which is recognised as challenging for them especially since legal proceedings were ongoing and exemptions on disclosure of information applied. There is evidence of individual members appearing to support the lobby through attendance at court and social media posts which was challenging for officers managing staff who were overtly named in media sources and threats placed against their safety. There were misinformation and disinformation reported through the media from the commencement of the case.
- **5.5** There was approximately 150 Freedom of Information and Customer Care enquiries/complaints received which were responded to by council officers within the policy deadlines.
- **5.6** A significant element of the lobby in the initial weeks after Max was found and typed by council officers as a Pit Bull Terrier Type was his age and the assertion that he could not be accurately typed until at least nine months old. Council had sought advice from the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs who confirmed in writing to the council that *'currently there is no minimum age that a dog can lawfully be 'typed' by an expert.'*

7.0 Summary

There is a significant amount of information recorded in respect of this case. This report has aimed to outline a chronology of events that took place from Max was

seized as an abandoned dog until the conclusion of the court proceedings. It should be reiterated that it was never the intention of council for Max to be retained in kennels for this extended duration. During this period, we could not legally rehome the dog, either temporarily or permanently, as there is currently no provision for this in the legislation. The legal challenge did protract the process; council respects the right of individuals to legally challenge its decisions.

8.0 Key Outcomes/Learnings

As referenced, this case attracted significant media attention from the day that Max was found on the Comber Greenway in Dundonald through to the conclusion of the legal process. The query around who the legitimate keeper/owner of the dog was and the intervention of the USPCA meant that the dog was not euthanized in line with the provisions in the legislation at an early juncture. That said, as the case grew momentum and a vetted potential owner came forward, it was the intention of the council, subject to his dangerousness being carefully monitored, to put forward in its case, the desire for him to be re-homed with conditions.

This case was a precedent for the council, other local government authorities and indeed central government and there were several key outcomes and learnings which are noted and to be agreed as follows:

- registered keepers should remain liable for dogs that are microchipped in their name – this is despite the registered keeper in this case alleging that they sold Max to another person;
- the overarching principle was to protect the public and act in accordance with the legislation. Given the outcome in the court, this councils process and compliance were upheld thus confirming the courses of action taken were warranted;
- council's current guidelines state that to confirm type a 'second informed opinion is obtained to confirm the type of dog'. In this case we ended up with four assessments of the dog, with the fourth assessment acting in contrary of the other three. This was a peculiarity when the legal team presented the council's case in court it had full disclosure of all four assessments. Council officers were suitably trained to carry out these assessments and in any future case this should be sufficient to determine type. If an additional officer is required, this should, as far as possible, be carried out with permission by similarly trained officers from other councils;
- the judge praised the council in how it handled and presented the case and the professionalism of all four professional dog assessors. Reference in this

instance is to the council's officers who acted in accordance with the legislation in their assessments of Max;

- council to lobby the relevant government department for changes in Breed Specific Legislation (BSL) and areas that need amended to ease its interpretation;
- Officers to review internal guidelines in light of this case and subject to this review, continue to follow its own internal guidance in line with the legislation regarding stray dogs/banned breeds as a delegated function;
- Council's internal communications unit should be the primary source of information, internally and externally, regarding such matters;
- any amendments required to assessment documents after they have been completed must be initialled and dated;
- protection of staff and their safety should be paramount all threats should be reported to police and support of the council unequivocal;
- formalise protocols with third party organisation eg USPCA for any future instances of this nature to ensure that engagement and partnership arrangements are streamlined;

In this case Lord Justice Glidewell noted the distinction between breed and type and stated, "if it were intended that it should refer to a particular breed, there would have been no difficulty in referring to a particular breed saying, "any American Pit Bull Terrier", even though that breed is not accepted by the British Kennel Club. We therefore find that the meaning of the Concise Oxford English Dictionary is appropriate-a general meaning not a technical one. The words mean that a dog "of the type known as a pit bull terrier" is an animal approximately amounting to, near to, having a substantial number of characteristics of the pit bull terrier".

This confirmation standard was written by Ralf Greenwood in 1976 and was published in the Pitt Bull Gazette, Volume 1, Issue 3 in 1977.

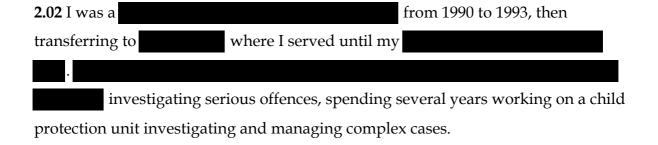

Qualifications and Experience

2.01 I am an associate canine behaviourist. I hold a BSc (Hons) Canine Behaviour Management from the University of Hull. I am an associate certified member of the International Association of Animal Behaviour Consultants and a full member of the Pet Professionals Guild.



2.03 I have worked with dogs for 17 years. After initially working as a where I handled excess of 1000 dogs, I began the study of Canine Behaviour. In 2014 I achieved a Diploma in Canine Behaviour and Management (Dip CBM) through Compass Education. I then completed a BSc (Hons) in Canine Behaviour Management at the University of Hull, graduating with first class honours in 2020. I also hold a Certificate in Canine Anatomy and Physiology.

2.04 I am currently in the final stages of completing my PhD research at the ; the subject of my research is the development of a tool for the assessment of risk of human directed aggression in dogs. My doctoral research has involved extensive study, over a four-year period, of risk factors for human directed dog bites. As a result, I have developed an in-depth understanding of the evidence for risk factors and the assessment of dog bite risk.

2.05 In addition to my research in the field of human directed dog aggression, I undertake further continued professional development, I have completed a number of additional courses including IAABC accredited Forensics of Aggression and Aggression in Dogs Master Course and attend conferences and seminars on a

regular basis including Dog Law for Professionals and The Aggression in Dogs Annual Conference.

2.06 In 2016 I began providing one to one dog training sessions and, presently I am a practicing Canine Behaviour Consultant providing behaviour consultations for pet owners experiencing problematic behaviours in their dogs across North Wales and Cheshire.

2.07 I have experience with working with dogs of both Pit Bull Type and game bred American Pit Bull Terriers from a dog fighting background in the USA. I have spent time studying the conformation and behaviour of both cross-bred pit bull type dogs and American Pit Bull Terriers, visiting Los Angeles Animal Services dog shelters, in particular South Los Angeles Shelter (Chesterfield Square) and North Central Shelter. Los Angeles Animal Services take in over 20,000 dogs per year, a large proportion being of pit bull type.

2.08 In May 2024 I spent time in my capacity as a canine behaviourist at a federal facility in the USA where animals seized from alleged dog fighting rings are held pending court proceedings. The dogs at this facility are predominantly game bred American Pit Bull Terriers; at the time of my visit there were approximately 300 dogs housed on site. I carried out some behaviour modification work with some of these dogs for the process of their rehabilitation.

2.09 I have shadowed a show judge of ADBA and UKC American Pit Bull Terriers in Ireland, observing in the show ring and gaining a further understanding of points of conformation and behaviour of the American Pit Bull Terrier and other bull breed dogs. I have handled large numbers of American Bully XL type dogs during legal assessments and in private practice. I have been instructed nationally to carry out breed type assessments of pit bull type and American Bully XL type dogs for a number of large organisations including Dogs Trust, the RSPCA, SSPCA and Edinburgh Dog and Cats Home.

2.07 I have experience working with street dogs in Tamil Nadu, India, with the Integrated Animal Care Centre charity assisting with a capture, vaccinate and release program. I have worked with The Cameron Dog Foundation in Sri Lanka and with fearful dogs rescued from the streets of Spain. I continue to work as a behaviourist on a voluntary basis with the Galgos del Sol rescue in Murcia, Spain.

2.08 I have provided training on the topic of canine behaviour and welfare to Greater Manchester Police Dog Training School, I am a guest lecturer at Bishop Burton College, The University of Lincoln, and Wrexham University and am a speaker at animal behaviour conferences internationally. I provide dog bite education to children in local schools and community groups throughout Flintshire.

2.09 I am listed in the UK Register of Expert Witnesses, I have been instructed as an expert by both prosecution and defence, and my expert evidence in respect of breed type and behaviour has been accepted in both criminal and civil matters. I have examined in excess of 300 dogs for legal matters including cases involving life changing injuries and fatality. I have also been instructed by claimant, defendant and as a single joint expert in civil personal injury matters.

Introduction

3.01 On 21st January 2025 I was instructed by Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council to carry out an assessment of the breed type and behaviour of a dog in their care and provide my opinion and an expert report in this respect.

Details of the case

4.01 The dog in question is named Max. Max was found as a stray on 6th December 2024 and taken to a veterinary practice where he remained for 4 days before being handed to enforcement officers at Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council. Max was assessed by officers as being of pit bull type and has remained in kennels in the care of the council.

Documents supplied

5.01 I have received no documentation in respect of this matter.

Determination of Breed Type

6.01 Under Section 1 of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991, S1(1)(a) applies to any dog that is deemed to be of 'pit bull terrier type.' The standard that should be applied in establishing whether a dog is of pit bull type, as specified by R v Knightsbridge Crown Court, ex parte Dunne; Brock v DPP (1993), states that the dog should substantially conform to the standard set for the breed by the American Dog Breeders Association. The standard consists of both anatomical and behavioural characteristics which the court are entitled to consider. For my assessment I refer to the breed standard as published in the Pit Bull Gazette Vol.1 Issue 3, 1977 and the current American Dog Breeders Association breed standard for the American Pit Bull Terrier which was revised in 2015. The American Dog Breeders Association breed standard was intended to be used to judge dogs in the show ring and not to establish breed type.

6.02 The American Pit Bull Terrier has been a prohibited breed in the UK since 1991, and as such, the majority of the dogs that are subject of court proceedings are likely to be cross breeds. It is entirely possible that in a litter of cross bred puppies some of those puppies may be of pit bull type, and some may not. As an illustration, in a breeding between a Labrador and a spaniel, some puppies may appear more like a Labrador and some more like a spaniel with varying degrees in between. Section 1 of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 refers to dogs of prohibited type and does not refer to any "dangerous" behaviour by the dog concerned.

6.03 My assessment of breed type involves an overall visual assessment and measurement of several features of the dog's anatomy where possible, using callipers and soft and rigid tape measures. The purpose of these measurements is to be able to establish certain ratios of anatomical features in relation to each other that are specified within the breed standard. Where it is not possible to take measurements, my opinion is based upon a visual assessment made at the time and examination of the video recording and any photographs taken at the time of the assessment.

6.04 Using my experience of working with, and examining, game bred American Pit Bull Terriers in the United States, I make a visual assessment of whether the dog appears to possess a substantial number of characteristics of an American Pit Bull Terrier; in simple terms does the dog look like an American Pit Bull Terrier? The use of measurement is then applied to confirm whether the dog does or does not possess the characteristics listed in the breed standard. Using measurement in addition to a visual appraisal provides a comprehensive and accurate assessment of a dog.

6.05 Given that a great number of dogs of differing breeds possess many of the characteristics specified in the breed standard of the American Pit Bull Terrier, it is essential that consideration be given to the number of characteristics required to set the dog apart from other breeds. Figure 1. in the addenda to this report illustrates the similarities that may occur between breeds that are considered prohibited and

those that are not. It demonstrates the similarities in body conformation between a boxer dog (not a prohibited breed) and an American Pit Bull Terrier. It is my opinion that to avoid confusing other breeds that were not intended to be subject of this act, a substantial number of characteristics, as stated in the legislation, should be at least two thirds of those specified in the breed standard of the American Pit Bull Terrier.

Examination

7.01 On 22nd January 2025 I attended an assessment area designated by Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council where I carried out an examination of a dog known as Max. I recorded the assessment using a Panasonic HC- V380 video camera. I produce copies of this video as exhibit I took several photographs of Max on my iphone and I produce these as exhibits

7.02 Prior to the assessment I asked staff who had been caring for Max whether he had had any health or behavioural problems and about his disposition in general. I was informed that there had been no concerns regarding Max's behaviour or health. Max has displayed no sign of aggression toward people or animals during his time in kennels.

7.03 Max is a male, 9-month-old, unneutered, merle coloured, bulldog cross. He appeared to be in good physical health, he had bright eyes and a glossy coat. During the assessment I scanned Max for a microchip and chip number 981020057747564 was detected. It is important to note that as Max is 9 months old it is possible that he may still have some growing to do. It is not possible to accurately make an assessment of breed type in dogs who have not reached physical maturity which for a medium sized dog (the pit bull terrier is medium sized) is a minimum of 9 months old. Max is a small dog and as such it is likely that his long bones are fully formed though this cannot be guaranteed.

7.04 An animal welfare officer handled Max for me during the assessment. Max was brought into the assessment area by a member of staff. He displayed some indicators

of anxiety, he carried himself low to the ground, his ears were back and there was some tension in his head (Aloff, 2006). Max showed no sign of aggression and when offered a treat he took it gently from my hand. I stroked him on his head and body and though clearly experiencing some anxiety he appeared to enjoy the physical interaction. Max rolled onto his back exposing his belly, this is an appearement behaviour often seen when dogs are feeling uncomfortable (Aloff, 2006).

7.05 I carried out a full set of measurements from Max, this is an invasive process involving a considerable amount of close handling. Max showed no sign of aggression during this examination.

7.06 I carried out a number of behaviour tests with Max. I asked Max to sit and give a paw, he performed both of these behaviours on command demonstrating his trainability. To assess Max's play style and for signs of toy guarding behaviour I engaged him in play with a tennis ball and a squeaky fluffy toy. He played with the toys appropriately and in a style typical of his breed type and showed no sign of aggression or indication that he would guard toys.

7.07 I assessed Max's response to having food removed from him by offering him a bowl of chicken and as he began to eat the food I removed the bowl from him. I then returned the bowl to him to allow him to eat again and as he ate I stroked his body. He showed no sign of aggression or gave any indication that he might guard food.

7.08 I assessed Max's response to startle by dropping a metal food bowl onto the concrete floor close to Max, though startled he showed no sign of aggression. To assess Max's response to novel objects I opened an umbrella close to Max, he startled at the umbrella but showed no sign of aggression and investigated it after the initial startle.

7.09 I assessed Max's response to other dogs by placing a stuffed dog in the assessment area while Max was distracted by the Animal Welfare Officer, when Max saw the artificial dog he approached it rather enthusiastically, knocking it over when

he reached it. He then sniffed its genital area and moved away from the dog appearing disinterested in its presence. Max displayed normal behaviour for a dog of his age (O'Heare, 2007).

7.10 The use of artificial dogs in behaviour assessments is common, as the use of real stooge dogs is often impractical or inappropriate on welfare grounds. Research has demonstrated that friendly responses to artificial dogs are consistent with those demonstrated to real dogs, but fear and aggressive responses may not be as accurate and are more likely to occur in the presence of an artificial dog. This is likely to be as a result of the lack of calming signals provided by the artificial dog (Rugaas, 2005; Shabelansky et al., 2015). In recent studies comparing dog's responses when presented with real dogs compared to fake dogs, similar responses and coping styles when presented with an artificial dog were seen as when presented with a real dog in populations of shelter dogs and dogs from a fighting background. (Reid et al., 2022; Barnard et al., 2019). It is important to understand that when using artificial dogs in assessments, the response of the dog being assessed should be interpreted appropriately. It is the initial approach to the artificial dog that is of relevance. The dog's body language and means of approach, for example arousal, excitement or stalking, provide an indication of how the dog would behave when seeing a real dog. At the point that the dog reaches the artificial dog and sniffs it, especially when the stuffed dog falls to the floor, it is apparent that it is a toy, and as such, the dog is likely to interact with it as it would with any other stuffed toy. It should also be noted that the responses to artificial dogs in assessments should not be used in isolation as the only diagnostic tool when considering whether a dog is likely to be reactive to other dogs. The test provides an indication based upon the initial response, but must be interpreted appropriately, and considered alongside a previous behavioural history wherever possible (Barnard et al., 2019). There are no reports of Max displaying aggression towards other dogs during his time in kennels. I was informed by the officers present at the assessment that the previous owner of Max had reportedly no longer wanted Max as there was conflict between Max and another dog in the home, however, the instigator of the conflict is unknown.

7.11 I assessed Max's tolerance for frustration by offering Max a piece of chicken and repeatedly removing it from him before he could take it. I then held the chicken in my closed fist in front of his nose before giving it to him. He showed no sign of aggression and waited patiently to receive the food, demonstrating good impulse control.

7.12 To assess Max's response to being roughly handled and threatened, I pulled him firmly on the lead and bumped into him with my legs a number of times. I then stood over him and shouted at him in a threatening manner. Max showed no sign of aggression and interacted with me in an affiliative manner immediately after this test. I ended the assessment and returned Max to the care of the kennel staff.

History of Max

8.01 Wherever possible a behaviour assessment should consider the history (behavioural, medical and husbandry) of the animal concerned (Shepherd, 2017). I was informed of the following information by the officers present at the assessment:

8.02 Max is reported to be 9 months old. He was found as a stray and handed into a veterinary practice. Staff at the practice took Max to their home and after 4 days Max was handed to the enforcement officers at Lisburn and Castlereagh City Council. Max was deemed to be of pit bull type by officers and has remained in a kennel facility since.

8.03 On investigation, officers managed to establish the following; the person that Max's microchip is registered to reported that he had sold Max online but did not know the details of the person he had sold him to. He had sold him as there was conflict between Max and another dog in the home.

8.04 The breeder of Max has been identified, they sold Max to the registered keeper as a puppy. They report that Max's parents were a French Bulldog cross and a

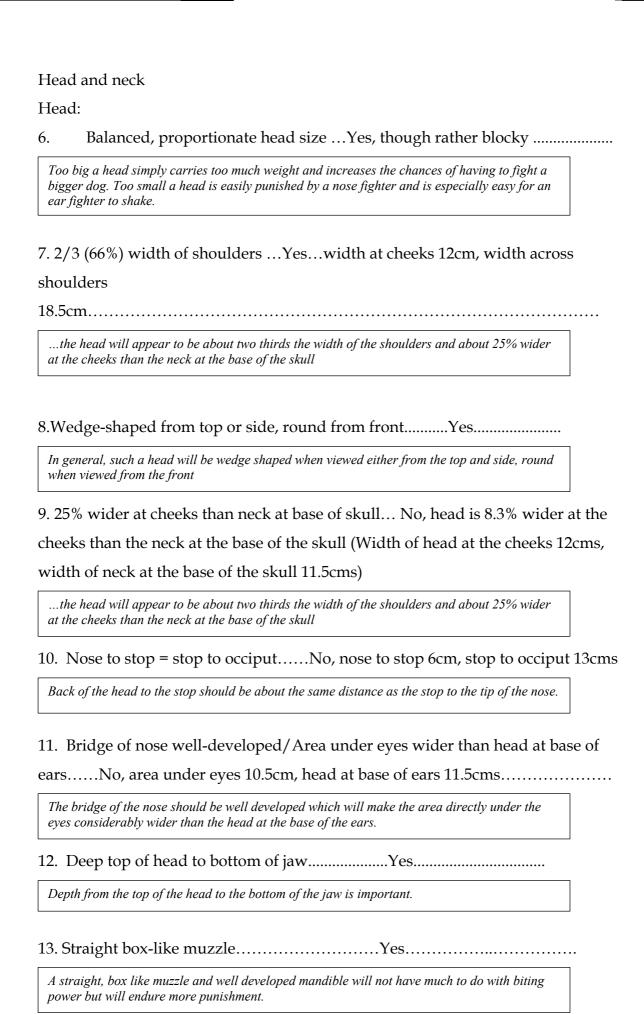
Staffordshire bull terrier cross. More details of his early rearing conditions are unknown.

Conformational Analysis

9.01 The points of conformation from the ADBA breed standard I have assessed are listed with details of how they appear in the Pit Bull Gazette Vol.1 Issue 3, 1977 written in italics below.

Conclusion and Opinion

10.01 It should be made clear that no test will ever be able to 100% predict the future behaviour of a dog and provide absolute certainty that a dog will behave in a certain way, nor should any test claim to be able to do so. The multifactorial nature of aggressive behaviour in any dog means that no professional is able to say with absolute certainty how an animal will behave in the future. My opinion regarding Max's behaviour is based upon my professional judgement, experience and scientific knowledge and is an assessment of the risk I feel he poses to public safety.

10.02 On assessment Max presented as a slightly anxious but sociable dog. Max showed no sign of aggression during an invasive assessment by a complete stranger. There are no reports of Max displaying aggression in any context.

10.03 My first impression of Max was that he was a bulldog cross. He has the distinctive undershot jaw and brachycephalic (short nosed) appearance of a bulldog. This is supported by the reports that his parentage is that of French bulldog cross and Staffordshire bull terrier cross. It should be noted however that section 1 of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991 refers to type, not breed.

10.04 My analysis of the points of conformation of an American Pit Bull Terrier (as per the ABDA breed standard) possessed by Max on examination indicates that Max conforms on 22 of 46 points of conformation (47.8%). Max does not therefore conform on more than two thirds of the characteristics specified, which I consider to be a substantial number, and as such, should not be considered to be of the type known as the pit bull terrier as described in S1 of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991.

10.05 In summary: In my opinion Max does not possess a substantial number of characteristics of an American Pit Bull Terrier and should NOT be considered to be of pit bull type as described in Section 1 of the Dangerous Dogs Act 1991. Max has shown no sign of aggression to people or other animals and does not pose a danger to public safety.
